

1. It appears twice in the e.e. cummings poem “little ladies more”. It also appears in the Tennessee Williams play *A Streetcar Named Desire* when Blanche DuBois asks it of Mitch. Seemingly awkward because of its use of the formal pronoun, it means, “Do you want to sleep with me (tonight)?” For ten points, give this phrase re-introduced to a new generation by Mya, Lil’ Kim, Pink, and Christina Aguilera in their 2001 version of “Lady Marmalade”.

ANSWER: **Voulez-vous coucher avec moi** (ce soir)?

2. In *Need for Speed: Most Wanted* it’s called “Speed Breaker”, and is most often used to dodge roadblocks. In *GUN*, it’s called “Quick Draw.” The earliest example of it is probably in the 1980 Epyx game *Rescue at Rigel*. In *Star Wars: Jedi Academy*, you can get it using “Force Speed,” by killing Reborn Jedis, or typing the cheat code “there is no spoon.” For ten points, give the common name for the ability in video games to move at normal speed while the rest of the game is slowed down, most famously used in the *Max Payne* and, predictably, *Matrix* videogames.

ANSWER: **bullet time** (Prompt on “slow motion” or equivalents. Note for itinerant cheaters: the cheat code is really “thereisnospoon”)

3. His favorite movie may be *Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood*, while he cried a lot when he paid to see *Godfather III*. His first name may be Marion, but his full name has also been reported to be William Williams. His business interests have included the wackiest secret tobaccky patch; pretzels, which led to a local war with the Yakuza; illegal fireworks, which were stored in a cave; rat milk sold to school children, and a Legitimate Businessman’s Social Club. For ten points, name this character voiced by Joe Mantegna, a mob boss on *The Simpsons*.

ANSWER: **Fat Tony** or **Anthony D’Amico**

4. Her brother Jeremy was the second husband of Lamb Chop puppeteer Shari Lewis. Non-fiction by this Wellesley grad includes the *Cosmopolitan* article “The Myth of the Multiple Orgasm” and the memoir *Sex and Shopping: The Confessions of a Nice Jewish Girl*, but she is best known for fiction such as *The Jewels of Tessa Kent* and *Til We Meet Again*. For ten points, name this romance novelist whose works that made the jump to TV include *Mistral’s Daughter*, *Dazzle*, and *Scruples*.

ANSWER: Judith **Krantz** (or Judy **Tarcher**)

5. (AUDIO) For ten points, name the 21st century film, given a snippet of dialogue. (Track 26)

ANSWER: The **40-Year-Old Virgin**

6. He has more self-given monikers than even Shaquille O’Neal, having released music under the pseudonyms Power-Pill, Blue Calx, and Caustic Window, among others. After his first proper releases, *Analogue Bubblebath* and *Xylem Tube*, he released a landmark record that referenced the bedroom recordings he started making at age 14, *Selected Ambient Works 85-92*. A remix for the likes of The Cure and Jesus Jones, he’s recently returned after a five-year hiatus with the album *Chosen Lords*. The alter ego of Richard D. James, bitch, this is, for ten points, what IDM artist best known for the single “Windowlicker”?

ANSWER: **Aphex Twin** (accept **Richard D. James** before mentioned in the question)

7. He spent this winter recovering from an eye infection triggered by blowing his nose too hard. A 2002 first-round pick from Parkview High School, he chose baseball instead of playing football at Clemson. He spent part of 2004 on the DL for Myrtle Beach after getting hit in the face with a ball. He made his big-league debut on July 7, 2005, and hit a three-run homer. He’d finish with 14 homers, a .300 average and 12 outfield assists for a runner-up finish for NL Rookie of the Year. For ten points, name this Braves phenom.

ANSWER: Jeff **Francoeur**

8. Part of the Italian street furniture company Jolly Pubblicita. The United States Hot Rod Association. The U.S. Touring Production of *The Lion King*. Yellow Checker Star Cabs Displays. SFX Entertainment. All are owned by this company which in its most famous area has acquired Apex, Chancellor, Gulfstar, Jacor, Dame Media, Clark Broadcasting, and Eastern Radio Assets. For ten points, name this media company which has been accused of censoring anti-war and anti-Bush sentiments and whose concert promoting tactics have led to musician boycotts.

ANSWER: **Clear Channel** Communications

9. The technical term for this practice is brachiovaginal eroticism. The court case *California v. Adam Glasser* dealt with its appearance in *Tampa Tushy Fest*. Dan Savage suggested trimming your fingernails before engaging in this practice, the subject matter of Deborah Addington's *A Hand in the Bush*. For ten points, name this practice whose anal version is known as "handballing."

ANSWER: fisting

10. This film earned Stevie Wonder his only Oscar for Best Original Song. Based on the French film *Un Elephant Ca Trompe Enormement*, it featured supporting performances by Joe Bologna, Charles Grodin and Gilda Radner. The story of Teddy Pierce and his midlife crisis, it co-starred Judith Ivey as Teddy's pistol packing wife, Didi. For ten points, name this 1984 comedy, which starred Gene Wilder as Teddy and Kelly LeBrock as the titular femme fatale.

ANSWER: The Woman in Red

11. The older one was just a name used by Chicago punk bands the Effigies, Naked Raygun, and Big Black to release albums rather than a real record label. The current one was co-founded by Jerry Heller in 1987. Over the years, its roster has included Blood of Abraham, The D.O.C., Above the Law, Bone Thugs n Harmony, and MC Ren. For ten points, name this gangsta rap record label whose other co-founder was N.W.A.'s Eazy-E.

ANSWER: Ruthless Records

12. Among this team's big offseason moves include acquiring Danny O'Rourke, Taylor Graham, Chris Henderson and former English Premier League player Peter Canero. It also made a bold move to select UCLA's Marvel Wynne, son of the former major leaguer, with the No. 1 pick in the MLS SuperDraft. However, its biggest shakeup was being sold to an Austrian group who renamed it after its well-known product. For ten points, name this team, formerly the MetroStars, now named for an energy drink.

ANSWER: New York Red Bulls (also accept Red Bull New York)

13. Gardner Dozois, who is credited with popularizing this term, claims not to have coined it, but may have gotten it from the title of a short story written by Bruce Bethke. Examples of it include the 1986 anthology *Mirrorshades*, edited by one of its proponents, the author of *Crystal Express* and co-author of *The Difference Engine*, Bruce Sterling. For ten points, name this subgenre often dealing with marginalized persons in high-tech societies, such as in the works of Sterling's collaborator, *Neuromancer* author William Gibson.

ANSWER: cyberpunk

14. A special between its third and fourth seasons examined Christmas at wartime, from truces to its host's involvement in the Toys for Tots program. Other specials included looks at Minot Air Force Base, current operations in the Persian Gulf, and a look back at D-Day. Premiering on August 4, 2002, its first episode showed how to drive a M5A1 tank, the fire rate of a Gatling Gun, and what made a samurai sword so effective. Featuring the gruff but loveable hosting of R. Lee Ermey, this is, for ten points, what History Channel show that provides answers for viewer's questions on the military?

ANSWER: Mail Call

15. He might easily have been a lawyer, or a Zappa-influenced guitarist. Fortunately, law was boring and his band, the Sons of Mr. Greeneyes, didn't get signed. His first acting gig in the play *Disco Pigs* led to a starring role in the movie version in 2001. A bit player in *Girl with a Pearl Earring* and *Cold Mountain*, 2005 saw him land the breakout role of Dr. Jonathan Crane in *Batman Begins*. For ten points, name this Irish actor, who played Jackson Rippner in *Red Eye*.

ANSWER: Cillian Murphy

16. Mick Jagger helped produce an album for them after being impressed by their guitarist's guest appearance on his album *Primitive Cool*. After this band broke up in 1995, the drummer and bassist formed Jungle Funk, while lead singer Corey Glover became a VH1 VJ. A hard rock act that won the 1989 MTV Best New Artist moonman, they reunited with Vernon Reid in 2001 and released the album *CollideOscope*. For ten points, name this act whose biggest British hit was "Love Rears Its Ugly Head" and whose biggest U.S. hit was "Cult of Personality."

ANSWER: Living Colour

17. He entered Georgia Tech at just 16, revived the school's bridge club and graduated with a computer science degree in 1991. By 1997, he would be a multi-millionaire as his company Netsys was bought by Cisco. Upon retirement, he backpacked across the world but then moved into a career in poker, finishing fourth in the 2001 World Series of Poker main event, which would lead to TV work. For ten points, name this 6-foot-9 poker star, the original analyst for Bravo's *Celebrity Poker Showdown*.

ANSWER: Phil Gordon

18. In *Ultima IV*, its starting town is Britain and its virtue is compassion. In the original Dungeons and Dragons, one had to switch between fighter, rogue, and mage to gain this status, which became its own “jack of all trades” character class in future editions. Edward Chris von Muir is one in *Final Fantasy IV*, where he is called a “spoony” once upon meeting Tellah, while in *Final Fantasy Tactics* it is limited to male characters just as only females can be Dancers. For ten points, name this character class who can create magic with music.

ANSWER: bard

19. He was suspended for six months in June 2002 after taking Ecstasy cut with amphetamines. His first big splash came in winning the 1993 world amateur road race title, and he captured a gold and a silver at the 2000 Sydney Games. He rose on the scene at the 1996 Tour de France, when he finished second behind teammate Bjarne Riis. That would be the first of five overall runner-up finishes, although he did win it all in 1997. For ten points, name this German cyclist, who has been second to three of Lance Armstrong’s seven titles.

ANSWER: Jan Ullrich

20. Patti LaBelle has made the most guest appearances on this show, and she provided its theme song during 1997. Its first national episode examined how to marry the man or woman of your choice, and featured author Margaret Kent, whose book on the subject was selling at \$95 a copy. It still airs at 9 am on its original station, WLS, which the host likes as it rewards the fans who first made the show a success when it was known as *A.M. Chicago*. Celebrating its 20th season this year, name, for ten points, this top-rated nationally-syndicated talk show known for its book club and for giving away 276 Pontiac G6s to one show’s audience in 2005.

ANSWER: The Oprah Winfrey Show

21. Jessica Rossi’s tough upbringing gives her an edge with interrogations – and insight from having family who’ve been on the other end of them. Billy Desmond is keen to keep his perfect record. Nick Potter left private practice, and is the newest member of his office. Christina Finn remains optimistic even after two years of the grind, while Brian Peluso is taking on some supervisory roles – even if it cuts into his nightlife. They all work for deputy DA James Steele, who reports to Alexandra Cabot, whose work for the Special Victims Unit still doesn’t get this show into the *Law & Order* franchise. They are all, for ten points, on what NBC legal drama?

ANSWER: Conviction
