1. Formed at the University College of London in early 1998, they independently released *The Safety EP* in 1998, while the *Brothers and Sisters EP* came a year later. A UK deal with Parlophone in April 1999 saw the release of *The Blue Room EP* in fall 1999. The spring of 2000 brought forth their first full-length album, which garnered them a nomination for the Mercury Prize and exposure on both the WB and ABC. For 10 points—name this British band, whose *Parachutes* LP features the smash single "Yellow."

Answer: Coldplay

2. As a Yale undergraduate in 1965, Frederick W. Smith, wrote a term paper about the passenger route systems used by most airfreight shippers, which he saw as woefully inefficient. For his trouble, he got a C-, but after a stint in the military, he bought Little Rock-based Arkansas Aviation Sales and began a small operation with 14 aircraft in 1973, which today is the world's largest all-cargo fleet in the world. For 10 points—name this orange and blue Memphis-based overnight shipper.

Answer: Federal Express

3. The first was a match-up of the St. Louis Cardinals and New York Giants which ended in a tie. It adopted its current format in 1971 when Los Angeles beat Houston 21-7. Played at Fawcett Stadium in late July or early August; in 2000, Dennis Miller made his broadcasting debut during this match-up as the New England Patriots shutout the San Francisco 49ers. For 10 points—name this annual exhibition match-up of NFL teams in Canton, Ohio.

Answer: Football Hall of Fame Game

4. NBC did not air the finale of this six-year series in the summer of 1993, leaving six unaired episodes that were only seen in syndication. An official ending wasn't shot, although the series was definitely going in a different direction with the lead characters heading off to Japan. The character the show was written for was gone by the first season, and her roommate, Jalessa Vinson-Taylor, was gone before the end as well. For 10 points – name this NBC spin-off that eventually revolved around Dwayne Wayne played by Kadeem Hardison and Whitley Gilbert played by Jasmine Guy.

Answer: A Different World

5. Roger Ebert compared this film to Luis Bunuel's *Un Chien Andalou*, saying that it may one day be considered a milestone of neo-surrealism. Characters include Betty, played by Marisa Coughlin, a disabled woman who enjoys having her legs whipped by bamboo, and the title character, played by Eddie Kaye Thomas. But the focus of the movie is Gord Brady, who partakes in such activities as spraying his father with elephant semen. For 10 points—name this April 2001 release, written by and starring Tom Green.

Answer: Freddy Got Fingered

6. Born in 1966 in the Oak Cliff section of Dallas, she attended Southern Methodist University for a year and a half before drinking up enough courage in a bar one night in 1985 to get up on stage with a local band. She would join that band and change the direction of it, leading them to release their first album in 1988, *Shooting Rubberbands at the Stars*, which featured her major hit, "What I Am." For 10 points—name this lead singer for the New Bohemians, who married Paul Simon in 1991.

Answer: Edie Brickell

7. It was started in 1980 by Bill and T.J. Palmer, who bought the Rio Bravo chain in 1995 but sold it in 1999 due to debt concerns. The first restaurant was in Atlanta, their second was open by 1982 and by 1989 they were nationwide. They crossed the 1,000 restaurant mark in 1998 and currently have over 1,200 locations in 49 states and 8 countries. For 10 points—name this chain famous for its Bourbon Street Steak and N'Awlins Skillet whose likes to be known as "The Neighborhood Bar and Grill."

Answer: Applebee's

8. This Bologna native's new #66 this season comes from his birth year. Reunited with Mo Nunn after a relatively unsuccessful two-year stint in Europe, his Honda-powered Reynard will bear the Pioneer and WorldCom logos, a change from his prior stint with the Target/Chip Ganassi team. Bringing his 15 career wins and 10 career poles back to the CART circuit—for 10 points—name this driver, the last man to win back-to-back CART season titles.

Answer: Alex Zanardi

9. Buddy Holly was so influenced by this 1956 film that he turned its famous retort line into his song "That'll Be the Day." The story is one of a Confederate veteran who finds that a Comanche raid has kidnapped his niece. Along with his nephew Martin, Ethan Edwards embarks on a years-long quest to find her. When they do, Ethan's racism cannot get past the fact that Debbie has become a Comanche. For 10 points—name this John Ford Western starring Natalie Wood, Jeffrey Hunter, and John Wayne.

Answer: *The Searchers*

10. The original working title of this film was *Tennessee*. Nitpickers have found issues with the trailer, including close-up shots of an anti-aircraft gun firing blanks, children playing an organized baseball game around 8:00 AM on a Sunday morning, and missile launchers appearing on the decks of several ships which were not even commissioned until the 1980s, about 40 years after the fact. For 10 points—name this World War epic starring Kate Beckensdale, Cuba Gooding, Jr, and Ben Affleck.

Answer: *Pearl Harbor*

11. Beginning in 1941, he worked on weekends on what he would come to call "The Log" while he worked at the Epiphone factory in New York. He attached an Epiphone neck, fingerboard and body parts to a 4" x 4" board and then "sandwiched" a couple of Epiphone guitar body halves, or "wings" to the solid center block. In doing so, he created the first solid bodied guitar, which he would license to both Epiphone and Gibson in his name. For 10 points—name this musician and inventor of the world's first electric guitar.

Answer: Les Paul

12. The first in the series was a 1955 coupe, which featured one of the company's first V-8 sport engines. A competitor to the Corvette and Thunderbird, but its size allowed it to be one of the first models raced at Daytona by the Chrysler. When it was discontinued in 1964 with the L line, it would lie dormant until 1998, when it was reintroduced as a V-6, 250 hp sedan. For 10 points—name this line of cars whose new M series is the 12th in the letter line.

Answer: Chrysler 300 series (accept 300M before M is mentioned)

13. Working his way through school, he started a chain letter that paid for an entire semester of college. He founded MicroSolutions, Inc. in 1983, and later sold it to CompuServe in 1990. Wanting to come up with a way to hear Indiana basketball games while living in Dallas, along with a college friend, he came up with the idea that would personally net him \$2 billion when Yahoo! bought out Broadcast.com. For 10 points—name this man, the oft-fined owner of the Dallas Mavericks.

Answer: Mark Cuban

14. This series featured Jane Kaczmarek (catch-MARE-ik) as the love interest of the main character for one season, Lainie Kazan as a mature student and Michael Tucci as the editor of the school's publication. Most notable for the fact that after airing for one year on CBS and the reruns airing on PBS, the show was picked up by Showtime and showed two more original seasons. For 10 points – name this TV series based on a 1973 movie which featured John Houseman reprising his role as Professor Kingsfield and followed the travails of James Hart at an east coast law school.

Answer: *The Paper Chase: The (Second or Third) Year*

15. He won his first Edgar Award for Best Mystery in 1976 at 27. In the quarter century since then, he has only penned eight novels, but has created a very well-known protagonist in Alex Cross, whom most people will know Detective Cross better as Morgan Freeman, who played him in 1997's *Kiss the Girls* and 2001's *Along Came a Spider*. For 10 points—name this Manhattan College graduate who also wrote *Jack and Jill*.

Answer: James Patterson

16. It opened in December of 1973 at 315 Bowery, highlighting Country, Bluegrass, and Blues artists like The Con Fullum Band and Elly Greenberg. It was only when owner Hilly Kristal was convinced by Terry Ork to let his band, Television, play along with another up and coming punk band, the Ramones, that the establishment began its reputation for being on the cutting edge of 70s music. For 10 points—name this Greenwich Village club.

Answer: CBGB's

17. MenuSaver Inc. of Orrville, Ohio is suing Albie's Foods of Bay City, Michigan, for violating its patent on a type of this product. Consisting of a "layer having a first perimeter surface coplanar to a contact surface," "at least one filling of an edible food juxtaposed to said contact surface," and "a second layer juxtaposed to said at least one filling opposite said first layer," it might not have been invented without the help of John Montagu, George Washington Carver, and Jerome Smucker. For 10 points - identify this food, a common lunch item for schoolchildren.

Answer: Peanut Butter and Jelly sandwich

18. Later franchises included ones in Fort Wayne, Battle Creek, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Muskegon, Milwaukee, and Peoria. Conceived by Phillip K. Wrigley, managers included Dave Bancroft, Max Carey, and Jimmie Foxx, while the original four franchises for the 1943 season were the Kenosha Comets, South Bend Blue Sox, Racine Belles, and Rockford Peaches. For 10 points—name this 1943-1954 "league of their own."

Answer: All-American Girls Professional Baseball League(accept A-AGPBL)

19. Briefly connected romantically to Eric Lindros, she did guest shots on *EZ Streets* and *Party of Five* before making her film debut in 1998's *Desert Blue*. She's big on New Year's Eve, her first major film role being set on December 31, 1982, and her marriage to Black Crowes frontman Chris Robinson occurring on New Year's Eve 2000. 2000 had her in three major film roles, including Dee Dee Travis in *Dr. T* and the *Women*, and Naomi Preston in *Gossip*, as well as her breakout role. For 10 points—name this ingénue, a 2000 nominee for the Best Supporting Actress Oscar for her role as Penny Lane in *Almost Famous*.

Answer: Kate Hudson

20. Stars, if you want to use the term loosely, on this series have included G. Gordon Liddy as crime lord Jacob Calder, Lisa Thornhill as Cie Baxter and Billy Dee Williams as Burton Hardesty. The star of the series, known more for commercials, started the series as Michael Cates, but was immediately placed in the witness relocation program, which is now mobile, and changed his name to Chance Bowman. For 10 points - name this CBS-produced, TNN-aired series about a man trying to catch Calder and avenge his family's murder behind the wheel of his big rig.

Answer: 18 Wheels of Justice

21. David Basner, Sherman McCoy, Ray Peterson, Steven Gold, Rick Gassko, Walter Fielding, Joe Fox III, Lawrence Bourne III, Chuck Noland, Sam Baldwin, Paul Edgecomb, Andrew Beckett, Josh Baskin, Joe Banks, Pep Streebeck, Det. Scott Turner, Jimmy Dugan, Mr. White, Jim Lovell, and Captain John H. Miller. For 10 points—all have been portrayed by what actor, who also has portrayed Forrest Gump.

Answer: Tom Hanks

22. So you sailed away into a grey sky morning. Now I'm here to say, love can be so boring. Nothing's quite the same now, I just say your name now. So you stole my world, now I'm just a phony. Remembering the girl, leaves me down and lonely. Send it in a letter, make yourself feel better. But it's not so bad—for 10 points—when you realize this toss-up is the lyrics to what 2000 single from those ultra-sensitive guys from Georgetown, Vertical Horizon.

Answer: **"The Best I Ever Had"** (prompt on "Grey Sky Morning")

23. Born in 1976, the league had every reason to believe that they would be successful; but they lasted just six seasons and never won more than 22 games. Led by players including Mike Kitchen, Rob Ramage, and Barry Beck, they were briefly coached by Don Cherry, who introduced the team's theme song "Rock and Roll: Part II" to the sporting world. For 10 points—name this defunct NHL franchise that moved from Kansas City in 1976 and to New Jersey in 1982.

Answer: Colorado **Rockies**

24. It made its television debut on October 11, 1952, after 19 years on the radio under the same name. Foster Hewitt was the announcer for the first game and would be succeeded by his son Bill a few years later. Sponsored for many years by Molson, it features, among its many segments, the "Satellite Hot Stove" and the "Three Stars of the Night." FTP, name the highest rated television program in Canada, whose "Coach's Corner" intermission segment features Ron McLean and the always outspoken Don Cherry.

Answer: *Labatt* **Hockey Night in Canada**

25. He started out his career as Rikk Idol in St. Louis radio and was named one of *Seventeen* magazines hottest DJ's in America. Leaping to television in 1996, he can now be seen or heard on four different places, including voice-over artist for E! and the male host of *Lover's Lounge* on GSN.
