Bonuses

1. For ten points each, groups composed of children of musicians:

1. "You're In Love" "Release Me", and "Hold On" were #1s by these offspring of Beach Boys, Mamas, and Papas.
Answer: Wilson Phillips
2. This group was formed by Ziggy and other children of Bob Marley.
Answer: The Melody Makers
3. "Anything" was a mid-90s Top 20 hit for these sons of Tito Jackson.
Answer: 3T

2. Name these Elmore Leonard works adapted to film for ten points each.

1. This 1953 short story about a deputy escorting a criminal, published in Dime Western magazine, has been filmed twice, in 1957 and 2007.
Answer: Three-Ten to Yuma
2. This 1996 novel featuring a smooth thief and his huntress became both a movie and a short-lived TV show, Karen Sisco.
Answer: Out of Sight
3. A stewardess named Burke tries to turn the tables on a gunrunner in this novel, which became the movie Jackie Brown.
Answer: Rum Punch

3. One of the games that was revisited during the Tim Donaghy scandal was the sixth one in the 2002 NBA Western Conference Finals. Answer the following about that series for ten points each.

1. That series featured the Los Angeles Lakers playing against this Chris Webber-led squad that could have clinched the series in six but ended up returning home to ARCO Arena where they lost game seven.
Answer: Sacramento and/or Kings
2. The Kings took a 3-1 lead after this King hit a game-winner with 8.2 seconds to go in game five.
Answer: Mike Bibby
3. Donaghy implied that the refs called game six in favor of the Lakers, an accusation that would explain the fouling out of both Vlade Divac and this other big man, currently a free agent who collected a championship ring during an injury-shortened season last year with the Celtics.
Answer: Scot Pollard

4. For ten points each, answer the following about Desilu productions.

1. 1966 saw the premiere of two enormously influential Desilu productions: *Star Trek*, and this intricately-plotted drama that popularized the phrase, "This tape will self-destruct in 10 seconds."
Answer: Mission: Impossible
2. This Walter Winchell-narrated series, controversial for its violent content and depiction of Italian-Americans, was spun off from a 1959 episode of *Westinghouse Desilu Playhouse*. David Mamet scripted the 1987 big-screen version.
Answer: The Untouchables
3. The multi-camera setup still in use today for filming TV programs was pioneered at Desilu and implemented by legendary German cinematographer Karl Freund, who directed such horror classics as *Mad Love* and *The Mummy* and worked with this director on the silent-film classic *Metropolis*.
Answer: Fritz Lang

5. Though nunsplotation may appeal to many, there's plenty of other entertainment to be derived from them that doesn't involve flagellation and repressed sexual desires. FPTE:

1. Sally Field portrayed Sister Bertrille, a nun with an interesting habit in this show set in Puerto Rico.
Answer: The Flying Nun
2. This William Edmund Barrett book was made into a 1963 film starring Sidney Poitier as an itinerant worker who ends up building a chapel for an order of East German nuns in Arizona.
Answer: Lilies of the Field
3. This South-African born consecrated virgin produced an acclaimed series of art history documentaries for the BBC in the 1990s.
Answer: Sister Wendy Beckett

6. Everyone loves an adorable Austrian-American that still has an accent. For ten points each:

1. This celebrity chef came under fire from various humane organizations for his support of the veal and foie gras industries in the early 2000's, though he now only serves well-cared for animals in his restaurants like Spago, red | seven and .The Source.
Answer: Wolfgang Puck
2. Though she used to dispense sniper bullets in the Haganah, advice on intimate relationships are the only thing this diminutive sex therapist is doling out these days.
Answer: Dr. Ruth Westheimer
3. This director described his English as "a mix between Arnold Schwarzenegger and Desmond Tutu." He won Academy Awards for directing *The Lost Weekend* and *The Apartment*.
Answer: Billy Wilder

7. Name these games that involve shaking a dice cup for ten points each.

1. The title event occurs when players roll all five dice with the same face and net a cool 50 points.
Answer: Yahtzee
2. Players score points based on the position in which the title creatures land after being ejected from a dice cup; the "double leaning jowler" is worth 60..
Answer: Pass the Pigs or Pigmania
3. Expansions for this Cheapass game include Deep White Sea and Cyburg.
Answer: Diceland

8. Answer the following questions about notable happenings at 2008's version of the annual Bonnaroo festival in Tennessee, for ten points each.

1. The most famous thing to happen at this past year's Bonnaroo was the controversy caused by this rap superstar, whose glow-in-the-dark show started at 4:45 AM, over two hours late.
Answer: Kanye West
2. Bonnaroo 2008 featured a set by these Kentucky-based rockers, making their fifth appearance in eight years, as part of a tour to promote their latest release, *Evil Urges*, which came out two days before the festival.
Answer: My Morning Jacket
3. Bonnaroo traditionally ends with a surprise "Super Jam" with a theme. This year's version featured an all-star band covering Tom Waits songs led by this eccentric singer-bassist best known for being the frontman of Primus.
Answer: Les Claypool

9. Some NFL franchises, like Pittsburgh and Denver, are famous for being able to turn over running backs and still get good results. And then, there are teams like the Cardinals. Answer the following about the running back desert that is Arizona for 10 points each.

1. While he has had 2 1000-yard rushing seasons since being lured away from the high-powered Colts offense in 2006, his yards per carry and receiving work have dropped off significantly since moving to Arizona.
Answer: Edgerrin James
2. This itinerant running back out of Virginia had more rushing yards in 2005 with the Bears than he had in three seasons combined with the Cards.
Answer: Thomas Jones
3. It is somehow fitting the franchise's all-time most prolific running back, dating from towards the end of their tenure in St. Louis, is probably more famous for being the MVP of Super Bowl XXV (25) with the New York Giants.
Answer: Ottis "O.J." Anderson

10. For ten points each, name the groups that perform the following TV theme songs.

1. This misleadingly-named Canadian rock band known for hits like "The Old Apartment" and "One Week" does the theme for CBS's *The Big Bang Theory*.
Answer: Barenaked Ladies
2. This no-longer-extant band from Tempe, AZ, known for the single "Banditos" from their album *Fizzy Fuzzy Big & Buzzy*, did the theme for FOX's *King of the Hill*.
Answer: The Refreshments
3. This group has contributed theme songs or music to four currently airing series: Disney's *Mickey Mouse Clubhouse* and *Higglytown Heroes*, Adult Swim's *The Oblongs*, and Comedy Central's *The Daily Show with Jon Stewart*.
Answer: They Might Be Giants

11. For ten points each, name these movie cops from music-related clues.

1. This detective portrayed by Eddie Murphy in three *Beverly Hills Cop* films was given a musical motif by synthesizer master Harold Faltermeyer.
Answer: Axel Foley (accept either first or last name) (accept "Axel F.")
2. "Eastbound and Down" from the late Jerry Reed often accompanied the chases given by this ass-kicking sheriff played in three *Smokey and the Bandit* films by Jackie Gleason.
Answer: Buford T. Justice (accept either first or last name)
3. Portrayed by William Bramley onscreen as well as in the original Broadway run, this character was the title subject of a song in which the Jets sing, "The trouble is, we're crazy/The trouble is, we drink/The trouble is, we're lazy/The trouble is, we stink!" before addressing him with the line, "We've got troubles of our own."
Answer: Officer Krupke (from *West Side Story*)

12. The latest iteration of this series adds motorcycles and takes advantage of the Wii Wheel accessory. For ten points each:

1. Name this long-running series featuring Nintendo characters duking it out on the track.
Answer: Mario Kart (don't accept Super Mario Kart, the first game in the series)
2. Making her debut in *Mario Kart Wii* is this Princess from *Super Mario Galaxy* who lives in the Comet Observatory.
Answer: Princess Rosalina
3. One of the original levels in *Mario Kart Wii* is this shopping center filled with escalators that can change direction.
Answer: Coconut Mall

13. For ten points each, name these Ingmar Bergman discoveries who hit it big in mainstream Hollywood.

1. This man had a small role as a gas station attendant in *Wild Strawberries* and starred as a chess-playing knight in *The Seventh Seal* before going to Hollywood to play Jesus in *The Greatest Story Ever Told*. Other credits include Father Merrin in *The Exorcist* and Brewmeister Smith in *Strange Brew*.
Answer: Max von Sydow (prompt on "Sydow")
2. This man did Shakespeare at Sweden's Royal Dramatic Theatre before heading to Hollywood for roles in *The Tuxedo*, *Armageddon*, and *8MM*. He worked with the Coen brothers on *The Big Lebowski* and *Fargo*, and his TV roles include *Prison Break*'s John Abruzzi and *Seinfeld*'s "Slippery Pete."
Answer: Peter Stormare
3. This woman made her film debut in a bit part as a shop assistant in Bergman's *Face to Face* and later appeared as a maid in *Fanny and Alexander*; American audiences know her from *The Unbearable Lightness of Being* and *Enemies: A Love Story*, as well for playing Sydney Bristow's mother on *Alias*.
Answer: Lena Olin

14. Answer the following questions about Grace Kelly and popular music for ten points each.

1. Grace Kelly's biggest hit as a recording artist was with the song *True Love* from the musical film *High Society*. *True Love* was a duet with her co-star, this singer and actor.
Answer: Harry Lillis "Bing" Crosby
2. Somewhat more recently, Grace Kelly was among the many actors and actresses invoked by Madonna during the rap section of this 1990 smash hit.
Answer: Vogue
3. "Grace Kelly" is the first hit by this Lebanese-by-way-of-London pop singer, featured on his 2007 album *Life In Cartoon Motion*.
Answer: Mika or Michael Holbrook Penniman

15. Playing the most games without a post-season appearance seems like a dubious accomplishment for a baseball player. For ten points each:

1. Number one and two on the list have a lot in common. Both are Hall of Fame shortstops who spent their entire careers with a Chicago team. For ten points each, name the White Sox player from 1930 to 1950 and the Cub from 1953 to 1971.
Answer: Luke Appling (2422 games) and Ernie Banks (2528 games)
2. Despite cycling through six teams, most recently the Mets, this active leader in the stat had 1593 games coming into 2008. Then again, this infielder played a significant part of his career with the Tigers in the '90s.
Answer: Damion Easley

16. Nothing says "holidays" like cranberries and cranberry sauce. For ten points each:

1. Although some suggest otherwise, John Lennon insists that at the end of this song he is saying "Cranberry sauce" after discussing how "Nothing is real and nothing to get hung about."
Answer: "Strawberry Fields Forever"
2. Gregg Turkington's stand-up comedian character Neil Hamburger's recent opening for this band's "Pick of Destiny" tour usually didn't end until he got the entire crowd to chant "cranberry sauce."
Answer: Tenacious D
3. Cranberries are what eventually get the singer and a guy she's been chasing all year together in this song written by Chris Butler.
Answer: "Christmas Wrapping"

17. Lingering in the back of his head this season is the knowledge that his best friend and companion Ando is supposed to become his enemy. For ten points each:

1. Name this time-manipulating Masi Oka-played character on *Heroes*.
Answer: Hiro Nakamura
2. Brea Grant plays this super-fast character who is racing Hiro in an attempt to retrieve a formula.
Answer: Daphne Millbrook (accept either first or last name)
3. In season 1, Hiro fell in love with this waitress, who had the ability to memorize data quickly.
Answer: Charlie Andrews (accept either first or last name)

18. Sometimes even the crack staff at TRASH isn't quite sure how to define "trash lit." So we went looking for some help from the good people at amazon.com. For ten points each identify the authors of books frequently tagged as "trash" by Amazon reviewers.

1. For some reason, by far the book most often tagged as "trash" is the anti-religion manifesto *God Is Not Great* by this British-born columnist who has written for The Nation, Slate, and Vanity Fair.
Answer: Christopher Hitchens
2. Both books by this former music video dancer and porn actress, *Confessions Of A Video Vixen* and *The Vixen Diaries*, have been given the "trash" tag by Amazon reviewers.
Answer: Karrine Steffens
3. The most popular fiction books to be tagged "trash" by multiple readers are those of this author of *Deception Point* and most *Angels and Demons*.
Answer: Dan Brown

19. After a certain Italian movie became an art-house hit, it seemed like every filmmaker wanted to make his or her own surreal autobiography. For ten points each, answer these questions about rip-offs of *8 1/2*.

1. This man has a cameo in Paul Mazursky's version of *8 1/2*, 1970's *Alex in Wonderland* - which is appropriate, considering that he directed *8 1/2*.
Answer: Federico Fellini
2. This narcissistic filmmaker and choreographer directed his own *8 1/2*, 1979's *All That Jazz*, which seemed to predict his eventual death from a heart attack in 1987.
Answer: Bob Fosse
3. This 1980 movie, which marked the screen debut of Sharon Stone, takes its name from a Hoagy Carmichael song performed by Louis Armstrong on its soundtrack. It was Woody Allen's *homage* to *8 1/2*.
Answer: Stardust Memories

20. You'd be forgiven if you'd forgotten that the NHL has a team in Columbus. For ten points each:

1. Name the current head coach of the Blue Jackets.
Answer: Ken Hitchcock
2. The Blue Jackets play in this division.
Answer: Central
3. This left winger, who the Blue Jackets took with the first pick overall in the 2002 draft, is the team's career leader in goals with 154. He is also the team's current captain.
Answer: Rick Nash

21. Let see how much you've paid attention in your grocery store's international aisle as you name the following candies popular in Britain, for ten points each.

1. Sharing its name with a Procter & Gamble brand of paper towels, this chocolate bar with a coconut filling similar to Hershey's Mounds was one of three food items, along with hot dogs and 7-Up, found in the farmhouse where Saddam Hussein was captured.
Answer: Bounty
2. This Nestle product is essentially what would happen if all of the other candy bars got together and had an orgy: a wafer, caramel and crispy rice covered in milk chocolate.
Answer: Lion
3. Though a different chocolate bar with almonds was sold in the US under the same name until 2002, this British version of the Milky Way is sweeter and often enjoyed after being deep-fat fried.
Answer: Mars Bar

22. Answer the following questions about movie-related blogs for ten points each.

1. The popular blog "Sergio Leone and the Infield Fly Rule" is run by Dennis Cozzalio, whose other main claim to fame is that he briefly hung out with John Belushi while serving as an extra in this 1978 John Landis-directed comedy. He played a Delta pledge.
Answer: *National Lampoon's* *Animal House*
2. Another popular blog is this one, run by Jim Emerson, the former editor of rogerebert.com. It shares its name with a 1981 David Cronenberg film that co-starred Patrick McGoohan and famously features an exploding head.
Answer: Scanners
3. One of the best blogs for academic commentary is maintained by this UW-Madison professor, who co-wrote the ubiquitous textbooks *Film Art: An Introduction* and *Film History: An Introduction* with Kristin Thompson.
Answer: David Bordwell
