

# ACRONYM IX - Round 2 Bonuses

1. This song was specifically written for a Jeep commercial before becoming a major hit. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this song whose second verse proclaims "Long live the pioneers, rebels and mutineers." It later notes "It's our time to make a move."

ANSWER: **Renegades**

[10] "Renegades" was a hit for this band, whose members include the brothers Sam and Casey Harris.

ANSWER: **X Ambassadors**

[10] In "Renegades," the phrase "new kids" is curiously rhymed with the name of this legendary film director, who is ostensibly one such person.

ANSWER: Stanley **Kubrick** [accept **Kubricks**]

2. This athlete announced his retirement by way of a weird poem titled "Dear Basketball." For 10 points each:

[10] Name this long-time Los Angeles Laker, who will retire at the end of the 2015-16 season.

ANSWER: **Kobe Bryant** [accept either]

[10] Bryant posted the announcement to this website, which was founded by Derek Jeter as a resource for athletes to tell stories in their own words.

ANSWER: The **Players' Tribune**

[10] This other NBA player wrote the The Players' Tribune article "Unfinished Business," in which he announced he would re-sign with a team he was traded to in 2014.

ANSWER: Kevin **Love**

3. In one episode, this TV personality was derided for getting a Bob Dylan album personally autographed, since it would then only be valuable to him. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this man, who also incorrectly posited that Ansel Adams was a member of the Addams Family.

ANSWER: **Chumlee** [or Austin **Russell**]

[10] Chumlee appears alongside three members of the Harrison family on this History series.

ANSWER: **Pawn Stars**

[10] Throughout the series, Chumlee has exhibited a surprisingly extensive knowledge of these entertainment devices, including one from 1973 named "Odds & Events."

ANSWER: **pinball** machines

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4. For 10 points each, answer the following about the 2016 presidential candidates' experiences with social media:

[10] Jeb Bush noted that it's "cooler" to take this type of image "diagonally rather than straight up," and that it was better to do it "higher" for the sake of looking skinnier.

ANSWER: **selfies**

[10] Hillary Clinton offered up a questionable BuzzFeed-style list of reasons why she was like this type of person, the Spanish word for 'grandmother.'

ANSWER: **abuela** [ah-BWAY-la] [accept **abuelita**]

[10] In a post supporting the restriction of Syrian refugees entering the U.S., this candidate posted a map of the U.S. that put several New England states in the wrong place.

ANSWER: Ben **Carson**

5. Several artistic works have been realistic enough to be confused for authentic crime footage. For 10 points each:

a. In 1991, this celebrity called the FBI upon believing that a Japanese horror film was real. In 2015, this man revealed he was HIV positive.

Answer: Charlie **Sheen** [or Carlos **Estevez**]

b. Video found in a stray camera led a farmer to believe that he'd found a snuff film. In reality, it was footage from a music video by this band, fronted by Trent Reznor.

Answer: **Nine Inch Nails** [prompt on 'NIN']

c. Ruggero Deodato, a film director from this country, was once detained until he could prove that actors in one of his films were alive. The word 'Giallo' describes some horror films from this nation.

Answer: **Italy**

6. In 2016, the Pacific islander Moana will become the twelfth official member of this group. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this group of characters which does not formally include Anna and Elsa.

ANSWER: **Disney Princesses** [prompt on partial answers]

[10] Prior to Moana's addition, the newest Disney Princess was this red-headed daughter of Queen Elinor. This is the only Disney Princess to come from a Pixar film.

ANSWER: **Merida**

[10] Another recent addition to the Disney Princess lineup is this character from Disney's last traditionally animated film, *The Princess and the Frog*.

ANSWER: **Tiana** [prompt on "Tia"]

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7. Hockey owner Norm Green was hated pretty much everywhere he went. For 10 points each:  
[10] In 1993, Norm Green moved the Minnesota North Stars to this southern city, changing the team's name accordingly.

ANSWER: **Dallas** [accept **Dallas Stars**]

[10] Green cited the North Stars' poor performance as a reason for the move, even though they made the Stanley Cup finals just two years earlier, where they lost to a Penguins team, led by this hall-of-famer.

ANSWER: Mario **Lemieux** [luh-MEW]

[10] Before buying and moving the North Stars, Green also moved the Flames to Calgary from this city. A more recent team from this city also moved to Canada in 2011.

ANSWER: **Atlanta**, Georgia

8. Every January, a group of talented video gamers assembles for AGDQ, a week-long session of playing games in this manner. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this type of gameplay, in which a player attempts to complete a video game as quickly as possible.

ANSWER: **speedrunning** [prompt on descriptive answers that aren't this]

[10] Speedrunning often takes advantage of glitches to finish a game abnormally quickly, such as a glitch that allows this 1996 game to be completed without earning any of its 120 stars.

ANSWER: Super **Mario 64**

[10] The "any percent" speed record of the original *Super Mario Bros.* was broken in 2015. Within 10 seconds, give the total time taken to complete the game in that run.

ANSWER: **4 minutes, 57 seconds** [don't want to do math? just accept anything between **4:47** and **5:07**]

9. A Beastie Boys song titled for a "Professor" with this name aptly declares that it's another word for pirate treasure. For 10 points each:

[10] Give this slang term for a certain body part, which a K.C. and the Sunshine Band song implores the listener to "Shake Shake Shake."

ANSWER: **booty** [do not accept or prompt on any synonyms for this]

[10] "I don't think you're ready for this jelly" is repeated in "Bootylicious," a hit for this R&B group featuring Kelly Rowland, Michelle Williams and some other lady.

ANSWER: **Destiny's Child**

[10] A remix of the 2014 song "Booty," which refers to a large variety of the title object about 10 million times, was a hit for these two women, one of whom cancelled her 2015 "Great Escape" tour.

ANSWER: Jennifer **Lopez** and Iggy **Azalea** [prompt on partial answers]

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10. This company manufactured "Wacky Wobblers" bobbleheads before introducing a line of collectibles that depicts various characters with uniform heads and eyes. For 10 points each:

[10] Name that company, which currently manufactures a ubiquitous line of Pop! figures.

ANSWER: **Funko**

[10] Funko's Pop! figures, which depict everything from comic book characters to the stars of *Duck Dynasty*, are made of this material.

ANSWER: **vinyl**

[10] Among the rarer Pop! figures is a version of the character Freddy Funko that can do this, a feature shared by sticks filled with diphenyl oxalate [DIE-fen-ill OCKS-ill-ate].

ANSWER: it **glows** in the dark

11. For 10 points each, name these dramatic films adapted from books about the American military's endeavors after 9/11:

[10] Clint Eastwood directed this 2014 film about the late marksman Chris Kyle.

ANSWER: **American Sniper**

[10] This early 2016 film starring *The Office's* John Krasinski is centered on a group of "secret soldiers" present during a notorious 2012 attack in Libya.

ANSWER: **13 Hours**: The Secret Soldiers of Benghazi

[10] This 2013 film is based on Marcus Luttrell's book of the same name, which details the failed mission Operation Red Wings in which the rest of his squad is killed.

ANSWER: **Lone Survivor**

12. For 10 points each, name these founding members of the newest iteration of the Justice League International:

[10] One founding member is Guy Gardner, a member of this "Corps" that can construct things with the help of powerful rings.

ANSWER: **Green Lantern** Corps

[10] Two other members, the alter-egos of Beatriz da Costa and Tora Olafsdotter, are better known by the names of these two contrasting elements.

ANSWER: **Fire** and **Ice** [accept answers in either order]

[10] This other member was first introduced as a star football player from the 25th century, who traveled back in time to be a superhero using powerful gadgets he stole from a museum.

ANSWER: **Booster Gold** [or Michael Jon **Carter**]

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13. *Fashion Police* host Giuliana Rancic criticized this actress's use of dreadlocks at the 2015 Oscars. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this teenaged actress whose *Shake it Up* character Rocky Blue performed the song "Watch Me."

ANSWER: **Zendaya** [or Zendaya **Coleman**]

[10] Zendaya currently plays the title spy, who is the daughter of two other spies, in this Disney Channel original series.

ANSWER: **K.C. Undercover**

[10] When she was 13, Zendaya briefly performed with this kids' musical group that released its 31st album in early 2016.

ANSWER: **Kidz Bop**

14. For 10 points each, name these award-winning baseball teammates:

[10] This Puerto Rican shortstop made his debut in June 2015, hitting 22 home runs on the way to earning AL Rookie of the Year honors.

ANSWER: Carlos **Correa**

[10] Carlos Correa is a teammate of this large-bearded pitcher that won the AL's 2015 Cy Young Award.

ANSWER: Dallas **Keuchel** [KYE-kull]

[10] Correa and Keuchel both play for this most recent addition to the American League. Keuchel had a 15-0 record at this team's Minute Maid Park.

ANSWER: **Houston Astros** [accept either]

15. A BBC talent show named for this song was won by Danielle Hope, who later performed it in an Andrew Lloyd Webber musical. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this song, first sung in a 1939 film. It discusses a place where "happy little bluebirds fly."

ANSWER: **Over the Rainbow** [accept **Somewhere Over the Rainbow**]

[10] "Over the Rainbow" has been covered by numerous singers, including this bandleader who wrote "Moonlight Serenade" and died in 1944 when his plane vanished over the English Channel.

ANSWER: Glenn **Miller**

[10] Hawaiian music legend Iz performed a medley of "Over the Rainbow" and this other classic song, whose singer sees "skies of blue" and "clouds of white."

ANSWER: **What a Wonderful World**

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16. Google's annual Beauty Trends Report revealed a plethora of information about the year's most popular hairstyles. For 10 points each:

[10] Search rates skyrocketed for this hairstyle popularized in part by Harry Styles. In this style, medium or long hair is tied back in a round knot.

ANSWER: man **buns** [or **muns** or **bro buns** or **dude buns**]

[10] Among the other stars who popularized the man bun look is this member of a family of Australian actors, who is best known for playing a certain cinematic god.

ANSWER: **Chris Hemsworth** [prompt on 'Hemsworth']

[10] This actor, who co-starred in *Seven Psychopaths* and the second season of *True Detective*, has also been seen sporting a man bun.

ANSWER: Colin **Farrell**

17. The title entity of this TV series awards the Sacko trophy to its last-place finisher. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this sitcom about several friends who compete in fantasy football.

ANSWER: The **League**

[10] *The League* has featured numerous NFL personalities as guest stars, including this Hall of Fame Steelers quarterback and current *NFL on Fox* analyst in its third episode.

ANSWER: Terry **Bradshaw**

[10] One star of *The League*, Stephen Rannazzisi, drew controversy when it was revealed that he fabricated a story about having worked in this place, which he said was "inexcusable."

ANSWER: **World Trade Center**

18. On occasion, Hollywood will coincidentally produce two incredibly similar films and release them at around the same time. For 10 points each:

[10] In 2006, just two months separated the releases of two period dramas about magicians: *The Illusionist*, and this Christopher Nolan film starring Christian Bale and Hugh Jackman.

ANSWER: The **Prestige**

[10] 2012 saw two movies about this fictional character. One of them starred Kristen Stewart as this character, and the other co-starred Julia Roberts as Clementianna.

ANSWER: **Snow White**

[10] In 2013, two action films about attacks on the home of the U.S. President were released. All or nothing, name *both* films.

ANSWER: **Olympus Has Fallen** and **White House Down** [accept answers in either order]

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19. For 10 points each, answer the following about Pac-Man:

[10] In most appearances, Pac-Man is pursued by these characters, including Pinky and Clyde.

ANSWER: **ghosts**

[10] Pac-Man was created by this pioneering game company, which also created *Galaxian* and *Ridge Racer*.

ANSWER: **Namco** Limited

[10] Pac-Man was designed to be played indefinitely, but the game's limited memory renders it unplayable after 255 levels. That broken level, common in old games, is known by this name.

ANSWER: **kill screen**

20. This Texas A&M graduate repeatedly tells Leslie to shut her “pie hole” and loves nothing more than defending marginalized communities. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this character who replaces Victoria at his namesake job. He lives in a frat house with other similarly-minded people.

ANSWER: **P.C. Principal**

[10] P.C. Principal was introduced in the 19th season of this animated series about a group of foul-mouthed fourth graders.

ANSWER: **South Park**

[10] The season also detailed South Park's attempts to acquire one of these grocery stores, which bizarrely lifts off the ground and flies away in the season's finale.

ANSWER: **Whole Foods** Market
