



“Yo!, Pass the AUX Cord, You Better Not Read” TRASH set

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Round 3

1. This artist began his career in a polka band, and wrote hit songs for other artists during the 1950's and 1960's, including Patsy Cline's hit, "Crazy." After leaving the music industry for awhile in the early 1970's, this artist returned as the leader of the "outlaw country" movement,* along with artists like Waylon Jennings and Merle Haggard. His 1975 album *Red Headed Stranger* gave him one of his many nicknames, and his 1979 hit, "On the Road Again" established him as a force in country music. For 10 points, name this country artist, who still tours with his trusty old guitar "Trigger," and is known for his marijuana advocacy.

Willie Nelson

2. This athlete briefly played with the Indianapolis Racers of the World Hockey Association in 1978 before being traded to the team he is best known for. When he retired in 1999, he was immediately placed in the Hall of Fame, and his iconic number 99* was retired by all NHL teams. This star forward won four Stanley Cups with the Edmonton Oilers, but his 1988 trade to the Los Angeles Kings reinvigorated that team, and may have saved Sun Belt hockey. For 10 points, name this hockey star, who finished his career with the most goals and assists in NHL history, and was dubbed "The Great One."

Wayne Gretzky

3. During an early scene in this movie, one of the characters calls his fellow men "the middle children of history" and "slaves with white collars." One character in this movie loses his luggage, and has an apartment full of IKEA furniture,* while another sells soap, using rendered fat from liposuction clinics. The protagonist discovers his partner is planning "Project Mayhem" with members of the movie's title group. For 10 points, name this 1999 movie in which the Narrator discovers that he and Tyler Durden are the same person, and who have set up the title group, whose Rule #1 is not to talk about the title group.

Fight Club

4. This TV show was originally intended to focus on the parents, who were ex-hippies, but their children became the stars of the show. Tom Hanks appeared as the uncle struggling with a drinking problem on this show,* which featured Justine Bateman and Tina Yothers as the daughters in the family. The oldest child in the family was a wannabe yuppie who kept a framed photo of President Ronald Reagan on his nightstand. For 10 points, name this 1980's TV show, which made Michael J. Fox a star for his portrayal of Alex P. Keaton.

Family Ties

5. This music festival began in 1991 by Jane's Addiction lead singer Perry Farrell as a farewell tour for his band, but was so popular, that it turned into a yearly festival. The 1996 incarnation featured Metallica on its top bill, and opened in Kansas City, Missouri.* After the 1997 show, the festival ended, only to be revived in 2003. Since 2005, the North American version of this festival has been held in Grant Park in Chicago over a weekend, while others have been launched in Europe and Asia. For 10 points, name this concert festival, which derives its name from a term Farrell heard in a Three Stooges film.

Lollapalooza

6. This NBA team began as the Syracuse Nationals before moving to their current location in 1963. They won their first championship in 1967, led by center Wilt Chamberlain. This team's most recent championship was in 1983, led by Julius Erving* and center Moses Malone's prediction of "4,4,4" meaning the number of wins needed in each series. For 10 points, name this NBA team, whose former GM was the controversial Sam Hinkie who led a complete rebuild known as "The Process," which saw 28 wins total in the past 2 seasons, based in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia 76ers (accept "**Sixers**" their nickname)

7. In the first episode of this show, the titular main character is working as a nurse in a field hospital during World War II. This titular character and her husband take a trip to the Scottish Highlands where she discovers a series of sacred stones,* which causes her to travel back in time to 1743. While there, she meets, and falls in love with, Jamie Fraser, a Highland warrior. This show's 2nd season ends with Claire, in the present-day of 1968, returning to the stones to learn that Jamie had not died at Culloden {CULL-LAH-DEN} Moor as she thought. For 10 points, name this Starz show that will begin its third season in the summer of 2017.

Outlander

8. This mixtape was supposedly marketed as an album by its artist to get out of a record contract with Cash Money Records. One song on this mixtape samples the song "Tinted Glass" by Network, and hopes that "the real live forever" and "the fakes get exposed." That song was produced by Bo1-da ("boy one da") and is titled "Know Yourself." Another song on this mixtape includes a "diss track" directed at (*) Tyga, and says that "Bein' number two is just being the first to lose." For 10 points, name this mixtape by Drake including songs like "Energy" and "6PM in New York."

"If You're Reading This, It's Too Late"

9. Throughout this movie, multiple people mistake the main character, Roger Thornhill, for another man named “George Kaplan.” This man is blamed for the death of Lester Townsend at the UN Building, and ends up being chased by a crop-dusting* plane while waiting for a meeting at an isolated country road. This movie ends with a climactic finale on the faces of the Presidents at Mount Rushmore. For 10 points, name this 1959 Alfred Hitchcock movie, in which Cary Grant plays an advertising executive being chased by spies, and learns that there is no “George Kaplan.”

North by Northwest

10. The album containing this song is handed to Lawrence in the movie *School of Rock* so that he can practice its famous keyboard solo by Rick Wakeman. The band that wrote this song included on their 1972 album *Fragile*,* and were inspired by a tour through England where they encountered a number of title locations. The opening bass notes of this song achieved meme infamy for its use in the “To Be Continued” meme, showing various events frozen in time. For 10 points, name this 1972 hit song by Yes, which states “I’ll be your” *title location*.

“Roundabout”

11. In one episode of this TV show, the main character twice tears his “good” church pants while hanging out at a house that is under construction. This title character’s good friend is the troublemaking Larry Mondello, while his older brother Wally* constantly hangs out with Lumpy Rutherford and Eddie Haskell. That title character and Larry attend the Grant Avenue Grammar School in Mayfield where the family resides. For 10 points, name this TV show, which ran from 1957-1963, featuring the title character who is constantly finding mischief despite the best efforts of his parents Ward and June.

Leave It To Beaver

12. One of these individuals is in a forest clearing gathering berries when a young man sees her, unaware that he is betrothed to her. Another of these individuals loses her father when she is young, and becomes a maid* in her own home. Tiana was the first African-American one of these, and Pocahontas is often considered one of these. Belle becomes one of these through marriage, while Merida does not want to be one of these. For 10 points, name the birthright-based role, shared by Aurora, Cinderella, and Snow White, along with the others listed above.

Disney Princess(es) (prompt on a specific name)

13. This MLB team was awarded an expansion franchise partially because of the fear of a third major league. This team finished last or next-to-last for its first seven seasons, until its 1969 season, when it was led by dominant pitchers Jerry Koosman* and Tom Seaver. This franchise was the only team to win the National League East in the 1970’s besides the Phillies and Pirates when it won the 1973 title. For 10 points, name this franchise, which had a horrific 40-120 record in its inaugural season, located in the borough of Queens, in New York City.

New York Mets (Metropolitans)

14. This comedian appeared as the Eagles road manager in the 2000 movie *Almost Famous*, and his first comedy album was self-released in 1999 under the title *Strategic Grill Locations*. This comedian was known for one-liners like “My fake plants* died because I did not pretend to water them,” and “An escalator can never break...It can only become stairs.” At times, this comedian dealt with severe stage fright by wearing dark glasses and turning his back to the audience. For 10 points, name this comedian, whose last comedy album, *Do You Believe in Gosh?*, was released in 2008, three years after his untimely death.

Mitch Hedberg

15. Early songs by *this* band have titles like “Johnny, Kick a Hole in the Sky” and “Catholic School Girls Rule.” *This* band’s first guitarist Jack Sherman was fired after their self-titled debut in 1983, and their second guitarist, Hillel Slovak,* died of a drug overdose in 1988. He was replaced by John Frusciante {FROO-SHAWN-TAY}, who would help this band record the albums, *Mother’s Milk* and *Blood Sugar Sex Magik* before leaving the band in 1992. For 10 points, name this funk-rock band, formed in Los Angeles in 1983, which had massive hits with “Under the Bridge” and “Give It Away” in the early 1990’s.

Red Hot Chili Peppers (RHCP) (Yes, I realize I skipped all of their recent stuff, but I only had 6 lines!!)

16. One character in *this* movie threatens to return a fellow character to his previous location, “unemployed in Greenland,” while he tells another character that he was once so drunk, “he couldn’t buy brandy!” That character’s favorite word is “Inconceivable!,”* which he uses so often that one character states, “I don’t think that means what you think it means.” The main characters of this work are Westley and Buttercup, and most of the action for this story takes place within a book being read to a sick young man by his grandfather. For 10 points, name this 1987 Rob Reiner film about the title character’s love for a “farm boy.”

The Princess Bride

17. One entire episode of *this* show is devoted to a group thought to have died when the airliner Oceanic 815 crashed. The character Charlie Pace dealt with a serious heroin addiction while trapped on the island in *this* show, and eventually dies in the Season 3 finale* in order to save the others. The last two seasons of this show saw the characters trapped in 1977 for awhile, and the use of the narrative device “flash-sideways.” In the two-part finale of this show in 2010, most of the characters gather at a church, where they may or may not be dead. For 10 points, name this show about a group of castaways on a mysterious island.

Lost

18. The book *this* movie was based on was by Rosalind Wiseman and titled, *Queen Bees and Wannabes*. One character in *this* movie is the daughter of the guy who “invented Toaster Strudel,”* and keeps attempting to make “fetch happen.” Another character in *this* movie claims to have the ability to put her “whole fist in her mouth,” while another supposedly films “car commercials in Japan.” For 10 points, name *this* 2004 film, starring Lindsay Lohan as Cady Heron, who joins the “Plastics” while attending North Shore High School after having been homeschooled her entire life, and realizes the “limit does not exist!!”

Mean Girls (points off if you pronounced it “CAD-EE”)

19. This now-defunct franchise was one of the original teams in the American Football League, and won two league championships before the merger with the NFL. This defunct franchise’s slogan was “Luv Ya Blue!,” and was on the losing end of the “Comeback”* by the Buffalo Bills after leading 35-3 at the beginning of the 3rd quarter. This franchise announced that it would be moving to Tennessee for the 1998 season, which resulted in a 1996 season in their home stadium with average crowds of less than 20,000. For 10 points, name this formerly Texas-based franchise, which moved to Tennessee in 1998 to become the Titans.

Houston Oilers

20. Country musician Waylon Jennings gave up a seat on the plane involved in *this* event, and Tommy Allsup lost his seat by a flipped coin to a victim of *this* event. *This* event took place while the performers were on a concert tour called the “Winter Dance Party,”* which continued after *this* tragic event took place. The plane involved in this event took off from Mason City, Iowa, and its intended destination was Fargo, North Dakota. For 10 points, name this tragic 1959 event that saw the deaths of three prominent musicians, and now takes its name from a line in Don McLean’s 1971 hit song, “American Pie.”

“The Day the Music Died” (accept “Plane crash that killed Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens, and the Big Bopper” if someone is so inclined!!; prompt on partial answer)

21. This band’s breakthrough 3rd album featured the title track, “I’m Your Captain/Closer to Home” which became an anthem for many Vietnam veterans returning home. This band’s 1973 album, *We’re An American Band*,* and title song described concert life and the band’s travels through the Midwest. This band tried to recruit Peter Frampton to join them, but he chose to go solo. Later albums by this band featured hits like their cover of “The Loco-Motion,” and 1975’s “Some Kind of Wonderful.” For 10 points, name this Flint, Michigan-based band that took their name from a locomotive line that ran through the city.

BONUSES

1. "It's an older meme, sir, but it checks out..." For 10 points each...

(10) Name this prominent meme character who is dressed in a flannel shirt for a school picture, has braces, and sees an unfortunate chain of events follow.

ANSWER: **Bad Luck Brian** (prompt on partial answer)

(10) This Muppets character has two prominent memes, one in which he is drinking tea, and another in which he is talking to an evil, hooded version of himself.

ANSWER: **Kermit the Frog**

(10) This animal was a prominent meme throughout the summer of 2016, due in part to anger over his unfortunate death at the Cincinnati Zoo.

ANSWER: **Harambe** ("buzzers lit for...")

2. One song from this album, "The Battle of Evermore," is the only song by Led Zeppelin to feature a guest vocalist. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this Led Zeppelin album, released in 1971 without an official title, that features songs like "Rock 'n Roll" and "Black Dog."

ANSWER: **Led Zeppelin IV (4)** or "**ZoSo**" as it also called

(10) The most famous song from this album is this 8 minute long rock masterpiece which describes a "lady who's sure/All that glitters is gold/And, she's buying..." the namesake location.

ANSWER: "**Stairway to Heaven**"

(10) Led Zeppelin's notoriously stingy nature regarding the use of its music in commercials and movies led Jack Black to record a video, begging the band to use *this* song in the movie *School of Rock*, which is played while the students are traveling in Dewey's van.

ANSWER: "**Immigrant Song**"

3. Kevin Costner is a big fan of baseball, as is obvious by his movie choices. For 10 points each...

(10) In this 1988 movie, Costner plays a washed-up "player to be named later" who lands on the namesake team to mentor a young pitcher named Nuke LaLoosh.

ANSWER: **Bull Durham**

(10) In this 1989 movie, Costner plays an Iowa farmer who builds a baseball field in his cornfield, which causes various magical events to occur.

ANSWER: **Field of Dreams**

(10) In the 1999 movie, *For Love of the Game*, Costner's aging pitcher is in the midst of one *these* uncommon baseball events when he begins pondering a failed relationship.

ANSWER: **No-hitter** (accept equivalents like "**hitless game**")

4. It's time for some "Love" songs!!! For 10 points each...

(10) This 1980's band, named for a famous scientist, recorded a song simply called "Love Song," which says "Love is around you/Love is knockin'/Outside the door." It has a famous 2 minute long acoustic guitar intro.

ANSWER: **Tesla**

(10) In a 1975 song, the band Nazareth stated that "Love" does *this action*. This song has also been recorded by numerous country artists like Roy Orbison.

ANSWER: **"Love Hurts"**

(10) This band went through a "disco period" and recorded "I Was Made for Loving You" in 1979. Their biggest hit was "Rock n' Roll All Nite"

ANSWER: **Kiss**

5. This bonus is about Canadian TV shows. For 10 points each...

(10) This variety show launched in 1976 in Toronto, and was set on the backstage of a fictitious television network. It is best known for the McKenzie brothers and its promotions for fake shows that were never going to air.

ANSWER: **Second City Television (SCTV)**

(10) This show began in 1979 about a group of kids living on the namesake street in Toronto. It evolved into "Junior High" and "High School" versions, and starred hip-hop artist Drake in his first acting role.

ANSWER: **DeGrassi** (accept **"DeGrassi Next Generations"**)

(10) This sketch comedy show ran on HBO from 1989 to 1995. They released a film in 1996 called *Brain Candy*, and were known for sketches like "Headcrusher," "the Chicken Lady," and "Cabbage Head."

ANSWER: **The Kids in the Hall**

6. Interviews in sports can sometimes take a left turn. For 10 points each...

(10) This Philadelphia 76ers star was asked about his practice habits during a 2002 interview, which prompted him to rant, "We talkin' bout practice, man!" over 22 times.

ANSWER: **Allen Iverson**

(10) In 2007, Mike Gundy, the football coach of *this university*, was asked about an article written about his then-quarterback Bobby Reid, which prompted a threat, "Come after me! I'm a man! I'm 40."

ANSWER: **Oklahoma State University**

(10) Jim Mora, the coach of *this NFL team*, was asked after a particularly rough game if he thought they had a chance to make the playoffs. Mora responded "PLAYOFFS!! PLAYOFFS!! I just hope we win another game."

ANSWER: **Indianapolis Colts**

7. This band got its big break in 2009 in its hometown of Las Vegas when Train was unable to perform. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this band which released its debut album, *Night Visions*, in 2012, and has such hits as "It's Time," and "Radioactive."

ANSWER: **Imagine Dragons**

(10) "It's Time" was used in the trailer for *this* 2012 film about a young man's struggle with depression and school drama, starring Logan Lerman and Emma Watson.

ANSWER: **The Perks of Being a Wallflower**

(10) The video for "Radioactive" features actor Lou Diamond Phillips, and a series of small stuffed animals doing *this action* while being watched and cheered by a crowd.

ANSWER: **Fighting** (accept equivalents like "**cage fighting**")

8. The 2017 Grammy Awards were hosted for the first time by this late-night comedian. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this man who hosts the *Late Late Show* and is known for his "Carpool Karaoke" sketch, among others.

ANSWER: **James Corden**

(10) *This* Adele album won Album of the Year and Record of the Year and includes songs like "Water Under the Bridge" and "Hello," which won Song of the Year.

ANSWER: **25**

(10) This Drake album incorporated R&B, dancehall, hip hop, and pop with songs like "One Dance" and "Hotline Bling"

ANSWER: **Views**

9. *The Flash* and *Legends of Tomorrow* are spin-offs of this TV series, which first aired on the CW in 2012. For 10 points each...

(10) Name *this* TV show that starts when Oliver Queen returns home after being stranded on an island, based on a DC Comics series.

ANSWER: **Arrow**

(10) *This* actor plays Oliver Queen in *Arrow*. In *Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles: Out of the Shadows*, he played Casey Jones.

ANSWER: **Stephen Amell**

(10) In *Arrow*, Oliver Queen spent time on the island with *this man*, who returns in season 2 to try to kill Oliver and his family. In DC Comics, he is traditionally an enemy of the Teen Titans, and is known as "the Terminator."

ANSWER: **Deathstroke** (also accept either underlined portion of "**Slade Wilson**")

10. For 10 points each, name these MLB players from the 1930's.

(10) This pitcher played for the Philadelphia Athletics for nine years before signing with the Red Sox and later playing there for eight years. He won one MVP award and was voted to six all star games.

ANSWER: **Lefty Grove**

(10) This pitcher is best known for his outstanding performances with the St. Louis Cardinals. He won an MVP, is the only NL pitcher to have 30 wins in a season since end of the "dead-ball" era, and earned the nickname "Dizzy" from the Army.

ANSWER: **Jay Dean**

(10) This Yankee great earned two MVP's, got selected to seven All-Star games, won six World Series, and was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1939, before dying of his famous namesake disease.

ANSWER: **Lou Gehrig**

11. In the theme song to this show, the protagonist claims that he was "playing some B-ball outside of the school/When a couple of guys/That were up to no good/Startin' makin' trouble in my neighborhood." For 10 points each...

(10) Name this TV show, which ran from 1990-96, starring Will Smith as the title character, who moves into the title California city to live with his uncle and aunt.

ANSWER: **The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air**

(10) Smith's character, the Fresh Prince, was originally "born and raised" in this East Coast city, before leaving for California.

ANSWER: **West Philadelphia**

(10) Will spent much of his time harassing his two sibling cousins, both of whom grew up extremely wealthy and spoiled. Name EITHER of them.

ANSWER: **Carlton OR Hilary Banks** (their younger sister was Ashley, but Will didn't bother her as much!)

12. Name these movies, in which John Wayne did NOT play a cowboy. For 10 points each...

(10) In the 1948 drama *Wake of the Red Witch*, Wayne played Ralls, who had *this* profession, and who dies at the end looking for gold.

ANSWER: **Sea Captain** (prompt on "Sailor")

(10) In the notoriously awful 1956 film *The Conqueror*, Wayne played *this* famous Mongol leader, who dominated Central Asia in the early Middle Ages. The film sparked controversy because a number of the cast and crew developed cancer as the film was shot in Utah near a nuclear test-firing range.

ANSWER: **Genghis Khan** (accept "Temujin")

(10) In his earliest roles, Wayne appeared as an extra in sports scenes involving *this* sport, which he played at the University of Southern California before quitting due to injury.

ANSWER: **Football** (he played under his real name of Marion Morrison)

13. For this bonus, test your knowledge of the career of Stephen Curry. For 10 points each...

(10) Curry grew up in North Carolina where his father, Del, played for this NBA franchise that later moved to New Orleans. An expansion team in this city has now taken this name.

ANSWER: **Charlotte Hornets**

(10) Curry was not heavily recruited out of high school by major conference schools, and ended up attending *this* mid-major school north of Charlotte.

ANSWER: **Davidson College**

(10) Two years after Curry was drafted, the Warriors drafted *this* guard and fellow "Splash Brother" out of Washington State University.

ANSWER: **Klay Thompson**

14. Cleveland, Ohio has been the setting for numerous films and TV shows. For 10 points each...

(10) The opening song to *this* 1989 sports movie is Randy Newman's "Burn On" about a famous 1969 fire on the Cuyahoga River, which is used as a metaphor for the hapless Cleveland Indians.

ANSWER: **Major League**

(10) Cleveland was the setting for *this* TV show about the namesake comic's life working at the Winfred-Louder Department Store. Beginning with the 3rd season, the cast sings the theme song "Cleveland Rocks."

ANSWER: **The Drew Carey Show**

(10) This TV Land show premiered in 2010 and focused on three actresses whose plane is forced to land in Cleveland where they rent a house from Betty White's character Elka.

ANSWER: **Hot in Cleveland**

15. An urban legend persists that sales of men's undershirts declined because Clark Gable's character in this movie is shown shirtless. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this 1934 comedy starring Claudette Colbert {COLE-BEAR} as a runaway heiress, who is recognized by Gabe's ex-newspaper reporter while traveling, and the two eventually fall in love.

ANSWER: **It Happened One Night**

(10) *It Happened One Night* was one of the last films to be produced before the implementation of *this* Code, which regulated the content of movies until 1968.

ANSWER: **Motion Picture Production Code** (accept "**Hays Code**")

(10) In one scene from this movie, Colbert and Gable's characters are struggling to hitchhike a ride, when she does *this* action which prompts an immediate stop by a male driver. This scene has been parodied and imitated numerous times in other movies.

ANSWER: **Shows her leg** (accept equivalents like "**Lifts up her dress to show her leg**"; prompt on partial answer until "**leg**" is given)

16. Tim Kerr holds the NHL single season record for scoring 34 of *these* types of goals during the 1985-86 season. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this type of goal scored in hockey when one team has an advantage in skaters, due to a penalty on the opposing team.

ANSWER: **Power-play goal** (prompt on partial answer)

(10) A power-play lasts two minutes on a "minor" penalty, like "slashing" or "tripping," but can last up to five minutes due to *this* infraction.

ANSWER: **Fighting**

(10) During a power-play, the team that is down one (or more) players can use *this* tactic, in which they hit the puck to the opposite side of the ice. This is the one of the few times it is not penalized in a game.

ANSWER: **Icing**

17. This band's first album, *Cheshire Cat*, was released in 1995. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this skate-punk band, who followed up their first album with 1997's *Dude Ranch* which featured "Dammit (Growing Up)" which hit #11 on the Hot Modern Rock Tracks chart.

ANSWER: **Blink-182**

(10) Blink-182 followed up *Dude Ranch* with the 1999 album, *Enema of the State*, which featured *this* hit song, which states, "Say it ain't so/I will not go/Turn the lights on/Carry me home."

ANSWER: **"All the Small Things"**

(10) The band got its start in this southern California city that is located across the border from the Mexican city of Tijuana.

ANSWER: **San Diego**

18. This show was a spin-off of the police show, *The Rookies*, but only lasted 37 episodes. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this 1975-76 police show that focused on the title elite unit, and known for its instrumental theme song which hit #1 on the Billboard Hot 100 in February, 1976.

ANSWER: **S.W.A.T.**

(10) *S.W.A.T.* was produced by *this* man, who also produced the hit shows, *The Mod Squad*, *Charlie's Angels*, *The Love Boat*, and *Beverly Hills, 90210*.

ANSWER: **Aaron Spelling**

(10) *S.W.A.T.* was turned into a 2003 movie that starred Colin Farrell and *this* rapper-turned-actor, who currently stars as Sam Hanna on *NCIS: Los Angeles*.

ANSWER: **L.L. Cool J** (accept "**James Todd Smith**")

19. The events of 9/11 caused multiple movies to alter shots in their movies that featured the World Trade Center. For 10 points each...

(10) *This* 2001 film originally showed the title superhero, played by Tobey Maguire, capturing a helicopter between the Twin Towers, but the scene was removed in the final cut.

ANSWER: **Spider-Man**

(10) The climactic final scene of *Men in Black II* was supposed to take place at the Twin Towers, but was altered to *this* other New York City landmark located on its namesake island.

ANSWER: **Statue of Liberty**

(10) This 1998 film starring Ben Affleck and Bruce Willis as oil workers who save the world from a meteor strike, originally had shots of pieces of the meteor hitting the Twin Towers. They were edited out in 2002.

ANSWER: **Armageddon**

20. This album was released in May, 1971 as a follow-up to a self-titled debut album. For 10 points each...
