



“Yo!, Pass the AUX Cord, You Better Not Read” TRASH set

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Round 5

1. The first host of this show was fired after a drunk-driving offense, and this show was filmed in Philadelphia for his first twelve years. This show was criticized for allowing black performers, but the dancers and audience* were all white until this show moved to Los Angeles. This show launched the careers of numerous artists, like Aerosmith and Run-DMC, but saw its ratings drop with the advent of MTV. This show featured the “Rate-a-Record” sketch, where audience were asked to compare the merits of recently released albums. For 10 points, name this music and dance program, hosted by Dick Clark, which ran from 1952-1989.

American Bandstand

2. In the original celebration of *this* holiday, a clock was placed in a bag and nailed to the wall. Meatloaf is commonly served on this holiday, although ham and turkey were served in its first incarnation. In 2016, the *Tampa Bay Times* allowed readers to send in grievances* to be published on *this* holiday, December 23rd. The clock that originally was used for this holiday has been since replaced by an unadorned metal pole. In a traditional setup for this holiday, the “Airing of Grievances” precedes the meal, followed by “Feats of Strength,” which usually involves a wrestling match. For 10 points, name this holiday popularized by a 1997 episode of *Seinfeld*.

Festivus (for the rest of us...)

3. One of this performer’s most famous songs was originally a country-style tune called “Ida May.” This singer appeared in the 1964 movie, *The TAMM Show*, where he alternated performances with Gerry and the Pacemakers. This singer’s biggest hit, *Johnny B. Goode*,* was placed on a disc for the *Voyager I* spacecraft when it was launched in 1977. This singer’s other hits included “Rock n’ Roll Music,” “Sweet Little Sixteen,” and “No Particular Place to Go.” For 10 points, name this early rock n’ roll pioneer, who turned “Ida May” into “Maybellene” in 1955, for Chess Records, and passed away in March, 2017.

Chuck Berry

4. This actress survived the London Blitz, and began her performing career shortly thereafter. She was the original “Guinevere,” opposite Richard Burton, and was passed over for *My Fair Lady* for Audrey Hepburn. A botched throat surgery in 1997 left this actress with a distinct soprano* with a raspy alto, which prompted her to successfully sue the hospital for medical malpractice. This actress appeared in numerous musicals in the 1960’s and 1970’s including *The Sound of Music*, *Thoroughly Modern Millie* and *Darling Lili*. For 10 points, name this actress who won an Oscar in her first film, *Mary Poppins*.

Julie Andrews

5. This franchise was the only original American Football League team never to have played in its title game, and the only one that never had a winning season during the 10 year history of the AFL. This franchise’s first star player was “Franchise” Floyd Little,* and they made their first playoff run in 1977, with their famous “Orange Crush” defense. This franchise lost its first three appearances in the Super Bowl before winning back-to-back Championships behind franchise QB John Elway. For 10 points, name this NFL franchise, which most recently won Super Bowl 50 behind the play of its “Orange Crush 2.0” defense and QB Peyton Manning.

Denver Broncos (prompt on partial answer)

6. The two protagonists of *this* TV show continuously prank call a random individual from the phone book, prompting that individual to come after them after using *69 {said: STAR-69}. These two protagonists are given a pass by Principal McVicker* to leave Highland High School during a visit by President Bill Clinton, but they stick around campus anyway, showing off their pass. These characters regularly torment their hippie teacher Mr. Van Driesen, and their old-school neighbor, Mr. Anderson. For 10 points, name this duo, who watch and comment on music videos in their namesake show, when not scuffling through school.

Beavis and Butt-head

7. This song was originally intended for the aborted *Lifehouse* project, and the guitar riff after its bridge is similar to the song that follows it on the 1971 album, *Who’s Next*. This song is sung from the point of view of an antagonist named Jumbo, and states, “Nobody knows what it’s like/*To be the bad man/To be the sad man.” Limp Bizkit covered this song on a 2003 album, and its music video contains scenes from the movie *Gothika*, as well as lead actress Halle Berry. For 10 points, name this rock song, which states, “If I smile/Please tell me some bad news,” by British rock band the Who.

“Behind Blue Eyes” (the song that followed it was “Won’t Get Fooled Again”)

8. In the opening scene of *Silver Linings Playbook*, Bradley Cooper's character checks out of a mental health facility located in *this city*. *This city* is the setting for most of John Waters' films, including *Cry-Baby* and *Hairspray*,* and was the setting for Barry Levinson's film *Diner* and the long-running police TV show, *Homicide: Life on the Streets*. *This city* was also the setting for the continual conflict between the drug-dealing Avon Barksdale and the local police during the first season of *The Wire*. For 10 points, name this East Coast city, whose "Eastern" neighborhood was the setting for the two police dramas listed above.

Baltimore

9. *This NHL hockey player debuted in 1946 and is the only NHL player to compete in five different decades. This player played with the Omaha Knights of the USHL as a 17 year old before joining the team he is best known for. This NHL player is the namesake of a "hat trick," that consists of a goal, an assist, and a fight* in the same game. This left wing did not receive his famous #9 jersey until his second season in the league. For 10 points, name this player, nicknamed "Mr. Hockey," who won 4 Stanley Cups and 6 MVP's while playing with the Detroit Red Wings.*

Gordie Howe

10. *This artist released his debut album *O.B.E., Vol. 1* under the pseudonym "Breezy Lovejoy." This artist forms a duo with hip-hop producer Knxwldge {said: "knowledge"} that released the album "Yes Lawd!," and has songs such as "Lyk Dis" {LIKE- DISS} and "Suede." That group is called NxWorries {no worries}, and his solo albums include *Venice* and* *Malibu*. For 10 points, name this rapper and singer who appeared on six songs on Dr. Dre's album *Compton*, and has songs like "Am I Wrong" and "Come Down."*

Anderson .Paak {pack" or "pock"} (prompt on partial answer)

11. *This resident of Sandy Shores community in Blaine County is known for being a private business owner of his company T.P.I.* He is introduced by stomping Johnny Klebitz {KLAY-BITZ} to death and then kills many members of a local biker gang, the "Lost MC." He has been searching for his long-lost, and assumed dead, best friend Michael Townley who is now living under the name "Michael DeSanta" in nearby Los Santos. For 10 points, name this character from *Grand Theft Auto Five* who finds and works alongside Franklin Clinton and Michael DeSanta.*

Trevor Philips (accept either answer)

12. *This actor is one of two to refuse an Oscar, which he won for his signature role as a controversial general. This actor's first major role was as General Buck Turgidson in Stanley Kubrick's *Dr. Strangelove*,* which he resented since his character gives a completely over-the-top performance. This actor played Ebenezer Scrooge in made-for-TV version of *A Christmas Carol*, and his final role was in 1999's *Inherit the Wind*. For 10 points, name this method actor, who played the title general in 1970's *Patton*, for which he refused the Best Actor Oscar.*

George C. Scott

13. LA Dodgers pitcher Don Drysdale appeared on an episode of this series as himself, which prompts Greg to try and become a pitcher. The namesake family in this series gets lost in an old ghost town near the Grand Canyon in a three-episode arc at the beginning of Season 3.* A 1981 spinoff of this show featured two of the three daughters as newlyweds. This show aired for only five seasons, but has become a cult classic in syndication. For 10 points, name this TV series, about “a group” that “somehow formed a family” with 3 sons and 3 daughters, along with a widowed father and mother.

The Brady Bunch (the spinoff show was “The Brady Brides” or “The Brady Girls Get Married”)

14. One of the early names for *this* band was the “Peppermints,” and their self-titled first album featured the single “The Big Three Killed My Baby.” *This* band produced a Lego-inspired music video for their single “Fell in Love With a Girl,”* and a song from the same album, “We’re Going to Be Friends,” was featured on the 2004 film *Napoleon Dynamite*. *This* band’s 2003 album *Elephant* features their biggest hit song, and their last studio album was 2007’s *Icky Thump*. For 10 points, name this garage-rock band from Detroit, whose biggest hit was 2003’s “Seven Nation Army.”

The White Stripes

15. One player from a team in *this* league, Marvin Barnes, was nicknamed “Bad News,” and once told a member of his team that he wasn’t “gettin’ on no time machine!” That team, the Spirits of St. Louis, played its last two years in *this* league* before being bought out by its competitor. This league used a multicolored basketball and introduced the “slam dunk” contest and the 3-point shot, both of which were adopted by its competitor in 1984 and 1979, respectively. For 10 points, name this basketball league, which rivaled the NBA from 1967 until 1976, when four of its teams were absorbed into that league.

American Basketball Association (ABA)

16. This band recorded two albums, *Other Voices* and *Full Circle*, after the 1971 death of their lead singer before breaking up. A shortened version of a song from their self-titled 1967 debut album is played during the closing sequence of the movie *Apocalypse Now*.* This band’s lead singer has often been portrayed as “overshadowing” the rest of the band, especially in a 1988 film by Oliver Stone, starring Val Kilmer. For 10 points, name this psychedelic band, led by Jim Morrison until his death, of hits like “Light My Fire,” “Break on Through,” and the aforementioned “The End.”

The Doors

17. This show spun-off of the military drama *JAG* {said: *JAG*} in a two-part episode arc in 2003, and it has spun-off two similar shows from itself in a similar manner. The Director of the fictional title group of this show, Jenny Shepard,* was killed at a gunfight in a diner, and was replaced by her assistant, Leon Vance. One prominent character, Anthony DiNozzo, left at the conclusion of its 13th season. For 10 points, name this CBS show, whose spin-offs include “New Orleans,” and “Los Angeles” versions, starring Mark Harmon as agent Leroy Jethro Gibbs.

NCIS (accept Naval Criminal Investigative Service)

18. One character in *this* movie is forced to cut his long blonde hair in order to be on the team, which leads his teammates to nickname him “Sunshine.” The football team in this film was the result of school integration* using busing, which was forced upon them by the city of Alexandria, Virginia. The coach of this team is chosen by the school board as the first black coach in the city’s history, but is told that he would be fired if he “lost a game.” For 10 points, name this 2000 Disney movie, about the title football team with Gerry {said: GARRY}, Julius, “Sunshine,” and Petey, and starring Denzel Washington as Coach Herman Boone.

Remember the Titans

19. Originally starting as a manga, the theme song for this show was “Cha-La Head-Cha-La” for the first 199 episodes. This show is produced by Toei {TOE-E} animation, and its predecessor focused on the protagonist as a young man.* That protagonist, Goku, becomes one of the strongest characters in the series through his superhuman strength and durability, as do his sons, Gohan and Goten. For 10 points, name this anime series from Japan, known for its namesake seven balls spread throughout the earth, which different powers struggle to locate.

Dragon-Ball Z

20. This baseball player’s 1989 Upper Deck rookie card was the first ever produced by that company, and he recreated his iconic look for Macklemore’s music video, “Downtown.” This baseball player is credited with the “run that saved* baseball in Seattle” in a 1995 ALDS game against the New York Yankees. This player left Seattle in a 2000 trade to the Cincinnati Reds, but ended his career with the Mariners in June 2010, his last hit having been a walk-off single. For 10 points, name this iconic Seattle Mariners centerfielder, who began his career playing alongside his father and was elected to the Hall of Fame in 2016.

Ken Griffey, Jr. (prompt on partial answer)

21. A song from this band’s first album was cited as a causal factor in a murder trial for two boys accused of murdering their parents and a sibling. This band, whose song “Israel’s Son,” was on their 1995 debut album *Frogstomp*,* won a contest in their native Australia called “Pick Me” while still in high school. Their third album, *Neon Ballroom*, was considered their true breakthrough, with its massive hit, “Anthem for the Year 2000.” For 10 points, name this band, which was linked with the “grunge” movement when it first came to America, who is best known for the song “Tomorrow.”

Silverchair

BONUSES

1. An injury to this ligament used to be career ending for athletes, until the advent of microscopic surgery. For 10 points each...

(10) Name *this* ligament which forms a “cross-like” shape in the knee with the medial collateral ligament (MCL) and the medial meniscus.

ANSWER: **Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL)**

(10) *This* Green Bay Packers wide receiver tore his ACL in 2015 during a game against the Pittsburgh Steelers, forcing him to miss the rest of that season.

ANSWER: **Jordy Nelson**

(10) *This* former Kansas City Chiefs has twice torn his ACL, during the 2011 and 2015 seasons. Despite this, he is the active leader in average yards-per-carry in NFL history with 5.5 ypc.

ANSWER: **Jamaal Charles**

2. This TV show lasted five seasons, almost the exact time as the war it portrayed. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this TV show, which ran from 1962-67, and showed an American military unit after D-Day in France during World War II.

ANSWER: **Combat!**

(10) *Combat!* had two lead actors, Rick Jason and *this* actor, who would later be killed while filming a Vietnam War scene in *Twilight Zone: The Movie* in 1982.

ANSWER: **Vic Morrow**

(10) Morrow and two children were killed when they were hit by one of these devices, which were used for troop transport during the Vietnam War.

ANSWER: **Helicopter**

(Moderator: pay attention to Answer #1 and #2!!)

3. Many analysts believe the 2003 victory by amateur player Chris Moneymaker was the watershed for this competitive event. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this event, hosted in Las Vegas, that featured various professional and amateur card players in the title wager-based game.

ANSWER: **World Series of Poker (WSOP)** (prompt on partial answer; DO NOT prompt or accept “Texas Hold em” - SEE BELOW)

(10) The WSOP features *this* poker game, in which two “hole” cards are dealt to each player, while five “community” cards are dealt in three stages.

ANSWER: **Texas Hold ‘Em** (accept “**hold ‘em**” or “**No limit Texas Hold ‘em**”)

(10) The final card drawn in “Texas Hold ‘em” is known as “fifth street” or *this* aquatic term.

ANSWER: **The River**

4. The most recent version of this book was compiled in 2016, and the albums within it are listed chronologically. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this musical reference book that lists the title number of albums that one should listen to as a kind of “bucket list.”

ANSWER: **1001 Albums to Listen to Before You Die**

(10) The first album listed in the work is 1955’s *In the Wee Small Hours*, by *this* pop artist best known for “Come Fly with Me,” and “My Way.”

ANSWER: **Frank Sinatra**

(10) This artist has nine albums in the compilation, including his final album, *Blackstar*, released in 2016 shortly before his death from liver cancer.

ANSWER: **David Bowie**

5. One character in this movie asks a principal if “Barry Manilow knows that you raid his wardrobe?” For 10 points each...

(10) Name this 1985 drama film about six students, led by the ultimate “bad boy” John Bender, who are forced to spend a day in detention at Shermer High School.

ANSWER: **The Breakfast Club**

(10) This actress, who played Claire Standish in the movie, also starred in John Hughes’ *Sixteen Candles* and *Pretty in Pink*.

ANSWER: **Molly Ringwald**

(10) This song is played over the opening and closing credits of the movie, and has become synonymous with it, despite the fact that 3 other artists turned it down before it was recorded by Simple Minds.

ANSWER: **“Don’t You (Forget About Me)”**

6. The most recent player to hit this milestone was Ichiro Suzuki, who did so with a triple in August, 2016. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this milestone, which only 30 players in MLB history have achieved. 25 of those 30 have been voted into the Hall of Fame.

ANSWER: **3,000 Hits Club**

(10) The first player to hit a triple for his 3,000th hit was *this* Minnesota Twins designated hitter in 1996. He is now the Twins manager.

ANSWER: **Paul Molitor**

(10) Before Ichiro, the last player to reach the 3,000 hit mark was *this* controversial New York Yankees third baseman who hit a home run for his landmark hit.

ANSWER: **Alex Rodriguez** (prompt on partial answer)

7. The creator of this TV show conceived of it while studying at the Rhode Island School of Design. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this cartoon TV show, starring the Griffin family and their dog Brian, who reside in Quahog {KO-HOG}, Rhode Island.

ANSWER: **Family Guy**

(10) The show premiered on Fox in 1999, but was cancelled in 2002, only to return in 2005 after being on hiatus, largely due to *this* reason.

ANSWER: **DVD sales** OR **Syndication success** (accept equivalents; prompt on partial answer of either choice)

(10) The show generated controversy in 2010, when a character named "Ellen," with Down's Syndrome, has a mother who is the former governor of Alaska, which prompted *this* politician to call the show "heartless."

ANSWER: **Sarah Palin** (she was Governor of the state from 2006-09)

8. This actor and comedian is the only cast member of *Saturday Night Live* ever to host the show while still part of the cast, which he did in 1982. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this comedian, whose most famous characters on *SNL* include "Buckwheat," "Gumby," and "Mr. Robinson's Neighborhood," a parody of the children's show Mr. Rogers.

ANSWER: **Eddie Murphy** (prompt on partial answer)

(10) Murphy hosted that episode of *SNL* because the scheduled host, Nick Nolte, was ill. Nolte and Murphy had starred in *this* film, in which they play a San Francisco police officer, and paroled criminal, respectively.

ANSWER: **48 Hours**

(10) Murphy left *SNL* in 1984, the same year that *this* film was released, in which Murphy plays Detroit Detective Axel Foley, who heads west to look for his friend's killer.

ANSWER: **Beverly Hills Cop**

9. The 1968 death of Martin Luther King, Jr in Memphis, Tennessee inspired multiple musical artists. For 10 points each...

(10) *This* group released "People Got to Be Free" shortly after King's death and many believed it was released as a tribute, but the band states that song had already been recorded

ANSWER: **The Rascals**

(10) "Abraham, Martin, and John" was recorded in 1968 by *this* doo-wop artist, whose early hits had been songs like "Runaround Sue," and "The Wanderer" with his group, The Belmonts.

ANSWER: **Dion DiMucci**

(10) This Irish band described King's death as "Early morning/April 4th/Shots rang out/In the Memphis sky" in their 1984 song "Pride (In the Name of Love)" featured on their album *The Unforgettable Fire*.

ANSWER: **U-2**

10. The 2000 war drama *The Patriot* frustrated historians because of its numerous glaring inaccuracies. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this actor, who played the title plantation owner Benjamin Martin, and also appeared in *We Were Soldiers* and *Braveheart*.

ANSWER: **Mel Gibson**

(10) One major criticism of the movie was the fact that despite Gibson's character owning a plantation, *these* individuals who worked on it claimed they were actually "free men."

ANSWER: **slaves**

(10) Another scene that drew criticism was British soldiers and Tories gathering all of the members of a South Carolina town into *this* type of building, and setting it on fire.

ANSWER: **A church**

11. This North Carolina city was the site of the 1944 "Secret Game," in which two segregated basketball teams played each other in a locked gymnasium. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this city, which is located northwest of the capital of Raleigh, which is the home of Duke University, where his game took place.

ANSWER: **Durham**

(10) The all-black team involved in this game was the North Carolina College for Negroes, which was not allowed to play in either the NIT or *this* other national tournament, which was first played in 1939.

ANSWER: **NCAA Tournament** (accept "**NCAA Division I Tournament**"; prompt on "March Madness")

(10) The only observer of the game, which North Carolina College won, was a person of *this* profession who worked for the *Carolina Times*.

ANSWER: **reporter**

12. This TV show had two episodes postponed because of the 1999 Columbine High School Massacre. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this TV show that aired from 1997-2003, starring the title killer of the undead, who lived in Sunnydale, California.

ANSWER: **Buffy the Vampire Slayer**

(10) 1 of those 2 postponed episodes was intended to be the last for *this* character, who began a namesake spin-off show set in Los Angeles. He was a vampire who had an off-and-on relationship with Buffy.

ANSWER: **Angel** (accept "**Angelus**"; prompt on "Liam")

(10) In the Season 6 episode, "Once More, With Feeling," a demon comes to Sunnydale and puts a spell on the town, prompting them to do *this action*. This is often cited as one of the show's favorite episodes.

ANSWER: **Singing and dancing** (accept "**musical**")

13. It will take a nation of millions to hold back this bonus. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this hip-hop group that released the groundbreaking albums, *Fear of a Black Planet* and *It Takes a Nation of Millions to Hold Us Back*.

ANSWER: **Public Enemy**

(10) Public Enemy's two main artists were Chuck D and *this* artist, who was famous for wearing a large clock around his neck, and later had a dating show on VH1.

ANSWER: **Flavor Flav** {FLAYVE} (the show was "Flavor of Love")

(10) *Fear of a Black Planet* contains *this song*, which opens with Chuck D screaming, "1989!" and states "People, people/We are the same." This song appeared in Spike Lee's movie *Do the Right Thing*.

ANSWER: **"Fight the Power"** (we have to fight the powers that be...!)

14. One iconic scene in this movie is Steve McQueen's character jumping over a fence on a motorcycle while trying to evade the Nazis. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this 1963 film, based on an actual event in World War II, in which a mass exodus of Allied soldiers leaves a German POW camp.

ANSWER: **The Great Escape**

(10) The escapees in the movie build three of *these* devices to try and escape the camp. One was discovered by the Nazis, and the other was shut down to focus on the 3rd.

ANSWER: **Tunnels**

(10) This actor played Danny, one of the 2 characters who builds the tunnels. This actor later starred in *The Dirty Dozen* and the *Death Wish* movies.

ANSWER: **Charles Bronson** (accept "**Charles Buchinsky**")

15. Rock bands, love songs, and girls names, what a bonus combination!! For 10 points each...

(10) According to this 1985 Starship song titled after a namesake girl, "No time is a good time for goodbyes."

ANSWER: "**Sara**"

(10) On this 1973 song, the Rolling Stones ask the title character, "when will those dark clouds all disappear?"

ANSWER: "**Angie**"

(10) On this 1986 song, the band Boston promises the title woman that he is "going to take you by surprise/And make you realize."

ANSWER: "**Amanda**"

16. The first season of this show was known as *Good Morning, Miss Bliss* and starred Hayley Mills as the title teacher at a junior high school in Indianapolis. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this television show, which was retooled in 1989 by dropping the Miss Bliss teacher character, moving the story to Southern California and focusing on the students at Bayside High School.

ANSWER: **Saved by the Bell**

(10) This character was the main protagonist of *Saved by the Bell*, known for his various shenanigans at Bayside, including antagonizing his principal, Mr. Belding.

ANSWER: **Zack Morris** (accept either)

(10) Zack was also known for *this* tactic, in which he would freeze the action on screen and talk directly to the audience.

ANSWER: "**Breaking the 4th wall**" (accept "**Time-Out**" which is what Zack would say!)

17. A popular meme regarding this song shows a Golden Retriever inside a kennel. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this 2004 song in which the singer opens by saying, "Coming out of my cage/And I've been doing just fine/Gotta, gotta get down/Because I want it all," by the Killers.

ANSWER: "**Mr. Brightside**"

(10) The Killers released *this* single on their second album, in which lead singer Brandon Flowers opens with "You sit there/In your heartache/Waiting on some beautiful boy/To save you from your old ways."

ANSWER: "**When You Were Young**"

(10) A concert by the Killers was the first in the T-Mobile Arena in *this* city, which is their hometown, and now has 2 pro sports teams, the NHL's Golden Knights and the NFL's Raiders.

ANSWER: **Las Vegas**

18. If you are in a cabin in a wooded area, you may have found yourself in a horror movie... For 10 points each...

(10) This 1981 horror film made Bruce Campbell a cult hero for his portrayal of Ash Williams, who is the only survivor of a horrific spring break at an isolated cabin. This film was followed by two sequels, a musical, and a 2013 reboot.

ANSWER: **The Evil Dead**

(10) In 2002's *Cabin Fever*, a group of college students are infected with a flesh-eating virus whose cause is *this* entity, revealed the final scene.

ANSWER: **The local water supply** (accept equivalents like "**Lakes, streams.**")

(10) In this 2012 film, you learn that the namesake location is the site of a "religious offering" to an unnamed monster that lives below the surface, and is run by a "Director," played by Sigourney Weaver.

ANSWER: **Cabin in the Woods**

19. This NHL team has made the playoffs every year since 1990, which is the third-longest in pro sports history. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this Original Six franchise that is known as "Hockeytown," and is playing its final season in Joe Louis Arena.

ANSWER: **Detroit Red Wings**

(10) Beginning in 2017, the Red Wings will move into a downtown arena with the NBA Pistons that is named for *this* pizza franchise that was once owned by the former owner of the Red Wings, Mike Ilitch.

ANSWER: **Little Caesar's**

(10) The Detroit Red Wings logo is a pair of wings attached to *this* device.

ANSWER: **A red wheel**

20. This band's first album was a Biblical concept album with a completely black album cover. For 10 points each...

(10) Name this British progressive rock band that featured members such as Phil Collins, Peter Gabriel, Mike Rutherford, and Tony Banks, and which has recorded albums on-and-off since 1968.

ANSWER: **Genesis**

(10) Gabriel left the band in 1975 for a solo career in which he had hits with "Sledgehammer," and "In Your Eyes" which was made famous by *this* movie, in which John Cusack holds up a boombox playing it.

ANSWER: **Say Anything...**

(10) Phil Collins began his solo career in 1981, and released this Grammy-winning song on his 1989 album *...But Seriously*, which chronicles the plight of the homeless population.

ANSWER: **"Another Day in Paradise"**
