TOSSUPS:

1. **During a race at the 2007 European Indoor Championships, this athlete began running in the wrong direction after being tripped by Gunther Weidlinger. This athlete won the Chicago Marathon in 2018 with a time that broke his country's national record. This athlete finished third in a race at the Rio Olympics where Hassan Mead made contact with this athlete on the race's final bend. In another race at (*) the Rio Olympics, Galen Rupp accidentally clipped the back of this runner's heel. This athlete would go on to win that race, the Men's 10,000 metre final. For 10 points, name this British long-distance runner who won gold in the Men's five and ten thousand metres at the London 2012 Olympic Games.**

ANSWER: Mo Farah

2. **This team won the only World Series in which the bottom of the ninth inning was never played. Dan Gladden and Steve Lombardozzi each drove in a run for this team in Game 7 of that World Series. In a World Series *against* this team, Tom Lawless flipped his bat after hitting a home run off of Frank Viola. In a different World Series, Ron Gant argued that he was (*) pulled off of the bag by this team's first baseman, Kent Hrbek ("HERR-beck"). Jack Morris threw a 10-inning shutout to win Game 7 of that World Series for this team. Jack Buck said "We'll see you tomorrow night" after this team's center fielder hit a walk-off home run in a World Series Game 6. For 10 points, name this team that won the 1987 and 1991 World Series with Kirby Puckett.**

ANSWER: the Minnesota Twins [accept either underlined part]

3. **In a 2006 group stage match against Serbia and Montenegro, this player scored the game-winning goal in his first World Cup appearance. In a 2014 World Cup match against Brazil, Thiago Silva brought this player down in the box, leading to a penalty and a third-minute goal. An alleged dive by this player in a game against (*) Mexico at that World Cup led "no era penal" to become a popular slogan online. This player recorded the fastest sprint of the 2014 World Cup, beating Sergio Ramos to the ball before scoring in a 5-1 win over Spain. In the 62nd-minute of the 2010 World Cup Final, this player was denied on a breakaway by the outstretched toe of Iker Casillas. For 10 points, name this Dutch winger known for his signature move of cutting inside and scoring with the left foot.**

ANSWER: Arjen Robben

4. **During a Thursday Night Football game, one player on this team suffered multiple leg fractures while tackling Chicago's David Montgomery. Another player on this team is the only person to score two pick-six touchdowns in the same Super Bowl. A third player on this team was assessed an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty for mimicking the peace sign celebration of (*) Tyreek Hill. William Gholston featured on this team's "gravediggers", a defense which allowed the fewest yards per carry during the 2020 NFL regular season. In a playoff game won by this team, Matt LaFleur deciding to kick a field goal at this team's 8-yard line instead of going for it on fourth down. For 10 points, name this team whose 2020 roster included Shaq Barrett and Mike Evans.**

ANSWER: the Tampa Bay Buccaneers [accept either underlined portion; accept Tampa; accept the Tampa Bay Bucs]

5. **Jordan Bohannon performed this action in a 2018 game against Northwestern to honour a record set by the late Chris Street. Tre Jones executed this action in a 2020 game against UNC, allowing himself to send the game to overtime with a three-pointer at the buzzer. The Thunder brought a 2017 playoff game against the Rockets to within one point in the fourth quarter when (*) Steven Adams performed this action, allowing Russell Westbrook to hit a 27-foot three-pointer. Players performing this action must ensure their shot touches the rim to avoid a violation and allow their team to gather the offensive rebound. For 10 points, name this action taken at the foul line when attempting to generate an extra possession for the shooter's team.**

ANSWER: intentionally missing a free throw [accept obvious equivalents; accept foul shot for "free throw"]

6. **One athlete from this country defeated Harry Bradshaw in a playoff to win the 1949 Open Championship. The Sid Brews Trophy is awarded to the winner of this country’s “Sunshine Tour”. A closed stance and shut club face characterized the unusual “hooked” putting stroke of a golfer from this country; that golfer is Bobby Locke. Other golfers from this country won Open Championships held at Muirfield in 2002 and (*) 1959. The winner of the 2010 Open and runner-up at the 2021 U.S. Open hails from this country. It’s not the United States, but the “Big Three” that dominated golf in the 1960s consisted of Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, and a golfer from this country nicknamed Mr. Fitness. For 10 points, name this country where Ernie Els and Gary Player were born.**

ANSWER: the Republic of South Africa [accept RSA]

7. **This player received a three-game suspension in the 1997 NHL playoffs after attacking a reporter who claimed he had “poor mental toughness”. This player was booed by home fans that same year over comments he made about former coach Ted Nolan. This player dropped his glove during a brawl in the 2002 playoffs, but fell over before being prevented from fighting (*) Patrick Roy (“wa”). In 1994, this goalie posted a 70-save shutout win in a quadruple overtime game against the New Jersey Devils. In a triple overtime game in the Stanley Cup Finals, a game-winning goal against this goalie was allowed to stand despite Brett Hull’s skate being in the crease. For 10 points, name this six-time Vezina Trophy winner nicknamed “The Dominator”.**

ANSWER: Dominik Hasek [prompt on “The Dominator” before mentioned]

8. **Hans Schmid played his entire college career for this school. In a game against UNC, a stretch pass from Charlie Lockwood led a player from this school to score the NCAA Championship-winning goal. That player was Matt Riter. Since 1987, the number 22 has traditionally been worn by the best player on this school’s lacrosse team. In 2009, this school defeated Cornell to win its most recent (*) NCAA lacrosse title. Roy Simmons Jr. coached the lacrosse team at this school for 28 seasons. In a game between UMass and this school, Mikey Powell did a front flip before shooting. This school holds the record for most NCAA D-I (“Division One”) Men’s lacrosse championships. The Carrier Dome is the home of, for 10 points, what school in New York state?**

ANSWER: Syracuse University [accept the Orange; accept the Orangemen]

9. **Britta Heidemann (“HIGH-duh-min”) won a silver medal in this sport at the 2012 Olympics after winning the semi-final in the last second of the match. That final second was extended by a timekeeping error and the fact that this sport’s clocks cannot display times shorter than a full second. In one form of this sport, priority is decided randomly before overtime begins to determine who wins in the event of a tie. Boris (*)**

Onishchenko (“oh-ni-SHEN-ko”) was disqualified for using an electronic device to trick this sport’s stadium sensors at the 1976 Olympics. Shin A-Lam stayed on the piste weeping for 70 minutes following her semi-final loss in this sport at London 2012. For 10 points, name this sport which makes up the modern pentathlon with swimming, equestrian, and the laser-run.

ANSWER: fencing

10. **In retaliation for an elbow to the jaw, one player on this team clotheslined Kobe Bryant, earning an ejection and a one-game suspension. In a 1993 game, benches cleared after Doc Rivers ran at this team’s point guard Kevin Johnson. It’s not the Chicago Bulls, but in a moment sometimes called “The Shot”, this team forced a third overtime with a Rex Chapman three-pointer. Boris (*) Diaw was suspended one game after Robert Horry hip-checked another player on this team into the scorer’s table. In a posterized regular season moment, a player on this team dunked over Anthony Tolliver. That player on this team’s “Seven Seconds or Less” offense was Amar’e Stoudemire. For 10 points, name this team with which Steve Nash won two league MVP awards.**

ANSWER: the Phoenix Suns [accept either underlined part]

11. **In 2018, the Hoboken Guards won their first New York Championship in this sport. The final five minutes of a 1994 Championship in this sport included two goals conceded by Joe Quaid. After winning a Championship title in this sport, Joe McDonagh led his team's fans in singing "The West's Awake". The leading scorer at this sport's highest level championship tournament is Henry (*) Shefflin, with a tally of 565 over his 16-year career. Referees in this sport wave a white or green flag depending on whether the sliotar ("SLITTER") goes above the crossbar for a point or below it for a goal worth three. Players use the eponymous wooden stick to hit a ball in, for three and one, what sport played at the highest level in the All-Ireland Championship?**

ANSWER: hurling [accept senior hurling]

12. **Before the start of the 1965 AFL season, one athlete who played this position was indefinitely suspended by Sid Gillman for "insubordination". Following the 1950 merger of the NFL and AAFC, Arnie Weinmeister played this position almost exclusively. Ernie "The Big Cat" Ladd played this position as did a man who (*) threw his helmet in disgust after losing to the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl V ("5"). In Super Bowl VI ("6"), that Dallas Cowboy recorded a 29-yard sack of Bob Griese. The winner of the 1971 AP NFL MVP award played this position. That man, Alan Page, played this position from 1968 to 1976 as a member of the "Purple People Eaters". For 10 points, name this position played by Bob Lilly situated in the middle of a defensive line.**

ANSWER: defensive tackle [prompt on tackle before "defensive line"; accept tackle after "defensive line"; prompt on defensive lineman; prompt on nose tackle; do not prompt on or accept "defensive end"]

13. **In a 2014 game, the captain of this team broke his stick while scoring the game-winner in a shootout. Another captain of this team scored eight game-winning goals in the 2015-16 season, a record for defensemen. In a 2012 playoff series, this team's Mikkel Bødker ("boh-dker") scored back-to-back overtime winners, while Raffi Torres, received a 21-game (*) suspension for a hit on Marian Hossa while playing for this team. This team's head coach won the Jack Adams Award in 2010 after helping end a seven-year playoff drought. That man, Dave Tippett, took over after the resignation of a former coach and co-owner amidst this team's bankruptcy hearings. For 10 points, name this NHL team formerly coached by Wayne Gretzky.**

ANSWER: the Arizona Coyotes [accept either underlined part; accept the Phoenix Coyotes]

14. **Ray Knight performed this action immediately following an Eric Davis stolen base in 1986. In 2014, Travis Snider shook Martin Maldonado's hand to make amends for a previous incident where Maldonado performed this action after a Carlos Gomez triple. In 2010, Nyjer Morgan was clotheslined by Gaby Sanchez after performing this action (*) on Chris Volstad. In a 1993 game, one pitcher was *not* ejected after performing this action on a White Sox player that Pudge Rodriguez tried to hold back. Another player performed this action in 2016 after a double play started by Adrian Beltre was broken up by a hard slide at second base. For 10 points, name this action performed by Nolan Ryan and Rowned Odor to victims Robin Ventura and José Bautista respectively.**

ANSWER: punching in the face [accept punching in the head; prompt on punching with "To what body part?"; do not prompt on or accept "fighting"]

15. **One player with this surname was drafted 4th overall in the 1995 NBA draft by the Washington Bullets. That player with this surname was given a seven-game suspension in 2003 for threatening Tim Donaghy. Scott Skiles made an exception to his no-headband policy when a center with this surname signed with his team in 2006. In an interview following a Game 1 loss to (*) the Pacers in the 2004 Eastern Conference Finals, a player with this name claimed "we will win Game 2". A gong sound was played over the P.A. system at the Palace whenever one player with this surname made a big play. For 10 points, give this surname of Ben, who won four Defensive Player of the Year awards, and Rasheed, who holds the record for most technical fouls in a season.**

ANSWER: Wallace [accept Ben Wallace; accept Rasheed Wallace]

16. When asked by the King of Greece where he learned to swim, an athlete from this country replied “in the water”. That athlete, Alfred Hajós (“hah-joss”), was dubbed the “dolphin” of this country. Joan Harrison was the only athlete *not* from this country to win a Women’s swimming event at the 1952 Olympics. An athlete from this country won the Men’s individual sabre (*) at nine consecutive Olympics. While representing this country, 14-year-old Krisztina Egerszegi (“Egg-er-SEH-gee”) won a gold and silver medal at the Seoul Olympics. The Soviet Union lost to this country 4-0 in a game that ended early after Valentin Prokopov punched Ervin Zádor (“er-VEEN ZAH-dohr”). For 10 points, name this country that won the “Blood in the Water” match en route to winning the 1956 Olympic gold medal in Water Polo.

ANSWER: Hungary [or Magyarország]

17. In 2016, the eventual winner of this award hit 15 home runs but lost to Mark Trumbo in the first round of the Home Run Derby. In 2018, the eventual winner of this award hit home runs in five straight games, four of which came against the Miami Marlins. The eventual 2017 winner of this award set the hitting record for most strikeouts in a single postseason: a disappointing end to a season in which he hit (*) 39 home runs. This award’s 2019 winner led MLB in home runs with 53 as a first baseman for the Mets. The 2015 winner of this award, a third baseman for the Cubs, spent the first 12 days of the season in the minors due to service-time manipulation. Kris Bryant and Pete Alonso have won, for 10 points, what award, won by Ronald Acuña Jr. in 2017.

ANSWER: National League Rookie of the Year Award [accept NL in place of “National League”; accept National League Jackie Robinson Award; prompt on Rookie of the Year; do not accept or prompt on “MLB Rookie of the Year” or any answers which mention the “American League” or “AL”]

18. In the aftermath of this event, Harold Ballard had gold medals made and presented to players of one of the involved teams. Everett Sanipass heavily criticized his teammate Pierre Turgeon for his lack of involvement in this event. This event resulted in a bronze medal being given to Sweden and a silver medal being given to the host country, (*) Czechoslovakia. A two-handed slash on Theo Fleury is often seen as the inciting cause of this event, which referee Hans Ronning tried in vain to stop by turning off the lights in the arena where this event took place. For 10 points, name this bench-clearing brawl that led to the disqualification of Canada and the Soviet Union from the 1987 IIHF World Junior Hockey Championships.

ANSWER: the Punch Up in Piešťany (“pee-uh-shtah-nee”) [prompt on a description of a Canada-USSR line brawl or Canada-Soviet Union line brawl before “bench-clearing brawl”; do not prompt on or accept any answers involving “Russia”]

19. In 2006, this club came within minutes of advancing to its first Champions League semi-final before Inzaghi scored a late winner for AC Milan. One manager of this club was fired despite winning this club’s first league and cup double; that manager was Alain Perrin. It’s not Lens or Manchester City, but this club retired the number 17 after (*) Marc-Vivien Foé (“foh-AY”) suffered a cardiac arrest on the pitch. A player who captained this club under Gerard Houllier (“OO-EE-yay”) holds the all-time record for the most free kick goals. This club developed youth players Hatem ben Arfa and Karim Benzema as part of a transfer strategy pursued by its president Jean-Michel Aulas (“oh-LA”). For 10 points, name this club that won seven consecutive Ligue 1 (“un”) titles from 2002 to 2008.

ANSWER: Olympique Lyonnais [accept OL]

20. After an undisclosed illness led this person to pull out of the scheduled main event at UFC 213, Joanna Jedrzejczyk (“jeh-druh-ZAY-chik”) “begged” Dana White to let her take this fighter’s place. In the rescheduling of that fight, this person won a controversial split decision over Valentina Shevchenko. At UFC 200, this fighter defeated Miesha Tate with a (*) rear-naked choke to become UFC Bantamweight Champion. 51 seconds into a 2018 fight, this woman knocked out Cris Cyborg to become the UFC Women’s Featherweight Champion. This fighter defeated Ronda Rousey in Rousey’s last career UFC fight. The first person to successfully defend two UFC Championship titles while actively holding each is, for 10 points, which Brazilian MMA fighter?

ANSWER: Amanda Nunes (“NOON-ezz”)

BONUSES:

1. Ali Farokhmanesh (“fuh-ROKE-muh-NESH”) led the University of Northern Iowa to victory over this school in a shocking upset at the 2010 March Madness tournament. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this school that defeated a Steph Curry-led Davidson in the Elite Eight of the 2008 NCAA tournament.

At the 2012 tournament, a team from this school coached by Bill Self lost in the final to Kentucky.

ANSWER: The University of **Kansas Jayhawks** [accept either underlined part; do not accept or prompt on “Kansas State” or “K-State”]

[10] After forcing overtime with a Mario Chalmers three-pointer, Kansas beat this team in the 2008 March Madness final. In that game, Derrick Rose missed a crucial free throw for this team with 10.8 seconds left in regulation.

ANSWER: The University of **Memphis** Tigers [prompt on Tigers]

[10] This Jayhawk made the pass to Chalmers on his game-tying shot. With 1 minute and 48 seconds left in the second half of that game, this player made a clutch three after generating a Derrick Rose turnover.

ANSWER: Sherron **Collins** (“shuh-RON Collins”)

2. In a 1968 game at the Met Center, this player fell backwards, hitting his head on the ice while skating across the blue line. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this player who never regained consciousness after his on-ice collision. He is the only player to die due to an injury sustained during an NHL game.

ANSWER: Bill **Masterton**

[10] Bill Masterton’s fatal fall was caused by an innocent hit from Larry Cahan and Ron Harris, two defensemen on this team. This team, captained by Bobby Baun, finished sixth in the West Division in 1968.

ANSWER: the **Oakland Seals** [accept the California **Seals**; accept the Bay Area **Seals**; accept the California **Golden Seals**; do not accept or prompt on “California” or “Bay Area”]

[10] Masterton’s number 19 is retired by this current NHL team. This team won the 1999 Stanley Cup with captain Derian Hatcher and goalie Ed Belfour.

ANSWER: the **Dallas Stars** [accept either underlined part; do not accept or prompt on “North Stars”]

3. Andy Murray is one of the many people who have backed the renaming of a stadium named for this Australian because of her vehement opposition to same-sex marriage. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this tennis player who won a record 24 Grand Slam singles titles. She also won 19 Grand Slam doubles titles and 21 mixed doubles titles.

ANSWER: Margaret Smith **Court**

[10] Martina Navratilova called for the Margaret Court Arena to be renamed in honour of this other tennis player who won the 1971 French Open without losing a set. That same year, this athlete partnered with Court to win the Australian Open Women’s doubles title.

ANSWER: Evonne **Goolagong Cawley** [accept either underlined part]

[10] An Australian team captained by Evonne Goolagong won this international team competition in 1973 and 1974. In 2020, this tennis tournament, whose Men’s equivalent is the Davis Cup, was renamed after Billie Jean King.

ANSWER: the **Fed Cup** [accept the **Federation Cup**]

4. This driver left Ed Carpenter Racing to join Team Penske at the end of the 2016 season. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this driver who won the 2018 Indy Grand Prix of Alabama at Barber Motorsports Park. At the 2021 edition of that race, this winner of the 2017 IndyCar Series caused a four-car crash on the first lap.

ANSWER: Josef **Newgarden**

[10] Despite finishing no worse than fifth in IndyCar Series points every year for the last five years, Newgarden has never won this race. Newgarden finished 12th in the 2021 edition of this race, which was won by Hélio Castroneves.

ANSWER: **Indy 500** [or **Indianapolis 500**]

[10] Newgarden’s three wins in the 2018 IndyCar Series came at Barber Motorsports Park, the Phoenix raceway, and this track. Turn 12 of this Wisconsin course is dubbed “Canada Corner”.

ANSWER: **Road America**

5. On Thanksgiving Day 1976, this player rushed for a single-game career high of 273 yards against the Detroit Lions. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this running back who was aided throughout the 1970s by an offensive line nicknamed “The Electric Company”. This player became the first person in the NFL to rush for 2000 yards in a single season.

ANSWER: O.J. **Simpson** [or Orenthal James **Simpson**; prompt on **The Juice**]

[10] This running back is the only Buffalo Bill with more rushing yards than O.J. Simpson. This winner of the 1991 NFL MVP award placed his helmet on Buffalo’s 34-yard line before every game.

ANSWER: Thurman **Thomas**

[10] Like Thurman Thomas, this Bills fullback and 1962 AFL MVP wore number 34. Segregated service in New Orleans prompted this player to lead a boycott of the 1964 AFL All-Star Game.

ANSWER: Cookie **Gilchrist** [or Carlton **Gilchrist**]

6. In non-deciding sets of this sport, players switch sides every seven points to mitigate the effect of natural elements like sun glare. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this sport played in pairs with court dimensions slightly smaller than its indoor counterpart. Karla Berger threatened to boycott an event on this sport’s world tour after Qatari officials announced a “bikini ban”.

ANSWER: **beach volleyball**

[10] Misty May-Treanor won three Olympic gold medals in beach volleyball while teammates with this athlete. When May-Treanor took a brief hiatus from volleyball in 2010, this athlete paired up with Nicole Branagh.

ANSWER: Kerri **Walsh** Jennings

[10] At the 2016 Olympics, Kerri Walsh Jennings and April Ross lost their semi-final match to a team from this country. The first Olympic final in Women’s Beach Volleyball was contested between two teams from this country.

ANSWER: **Brazil**

7. This team made its La Liga debut in 1998, 75 years after its founding. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this team that defeated Manchester United to win the 2021 UEFA Europa League Final. Gerard Moreno has won the last two Zarra trophies as a striker with this club.

ANSWER: **Villarreal** CF (“VILL-uh-RAY-AL”)

[10] Being a small and low-profile club that still manages to achieve success, Villarreal have been given this nickname. It’s not “The Pirates”, but Villarreal shares this nickname with fellow Spanish club Cádiz (“kuh-DEEZ”) CF.

ANSWER: The **Yellow Submarine** [or El **Submarino Amarillo**; or El **Submari Groguet**]

[10] The 2021 Europa League Final was won when this Villarreal goalkeeper saved a penalty taken by David de Gea (“de HAY-uh”). Prior to that penalty, this Argentine keeper scored on De Gea to make Villarreal’s eleventh penalty of the shootout.

ANSWER: Gerónimo **Rulli**

8. The 13th overall pick in the NBA draft has produced stars like Karl Malone and Kobe Bryant. Answer some questions about other 13th overall picks for 10 points each:

[10] This 2015 13th overall pick put up a 40-point triple-double in Game 1 of the 2021 Western Conference Finals. In this shooting guard’s second NBA season, he scored 70 points in a losing effort against the Boston Celtics.

ANSWER: Devin **Booker**

[10] In 2013, this Canadian big man was taken by the Mavericks with the 13th overall pick and immediately traded to Boston. This player dislocated Kevin Love’s shoulder while fighting for a rebound in the 2015 playoffs.

ANSWER: Kelly **Olynyk** (“oh-LYNN-ick”)

[10] The Phoenix Suns used the 13th overall pick in the 2011 draft to select this player. This player was dealt to Washington in 2016 after being fined for demanding a trade out of Phoenix the year before.

ANSWER: **Markieff Morris** [prompt on **Morris**]

9. The Indianapolis Colts have had some impressive comeback wins. Answer some questions about them for 10 points each:

[10] The Colts overcame an 18-point deficit to defeat this team in the AFC Championship game played in 2007. In that game, this team was held to 13 points in the second half, allowing Peyton Manning to reach his first Super Bowl.

ANSWER: the New England Patriots [accept either underlined part]

[10] In 2003, this kicker hit the game-winning field goal to complete a Colts comeback against Tampa Bay on Monday Night Football. This kicker missed a game-tying 46-yard field goal in the AFC Championship game played in 2006.

ANSWER: Mike Vanderjagt (“van-der-yawt”)

[10] This running back scored two touchdowns in Indy’s comeback win over Kansas City in the 2014 AFC Wild Card game. Andrew Luck scored his only touchdown of that game after recovering this Colt’s red zone fumble.

ANSWER: Donald Brown

10. “Candy Jim” Taylor moved this player from the mound to the outfield while managing the St. Louis Stars. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this center fielder given his nickname after striking out Oscar Charleston. This player known for his exceptional speed once scored from first base on a bunt in a game against the Bob Lemon All-Stars.

ANSWER: Cool Papa Bell [or Cool Bell; or James Bell; prompt on Bell]

[10] According to legend, Cool Papa Bell taught this player how to throw a knuckleball. This master of a trademark “hesitation pitch” left the Kansas City Monarchs at age 42 to win the 1948 World Series with Cleveland in his first Major League season.

ANSWER: Satchel Paige [or Leroy Robert Paige; or Leroy Paige]

ANSWER: the Dominican Republic [or República Dominicana]

11. Despite finishing in fourth the previous year, this club dropped seven spots to finish a disappointing eleventh in the 2005-2006 Premier League season. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this club that was knocked out of the 2005 UEFA Cup in the first round by Dinamo Bucuresti on an aggregate score of 5-1. In those matches, Tim Cahill scored this club’s only goal.

ANSWER: Everton FC

[10] Everton bought this Manchester United player at the beginning of the 2005-2006 season. Upon David Weir’s departure to Glasgow Rangers in 2007, this player became Everton’s captain.

ANSWER: Phil Neville [prompt on Neville; do not prompt on or accept “Gary Neville”]

[10] This Spaniard was awarded Player of the Season and Players’ Player of the Season while playing for Everton in 2005. In 2019, this person took over for Unai Emery as Arsenal’s full-time manager.

ANSWER: Mikel Arteta

<Association, MS>

12. In a 2008 race, Bode Miller rode the safety fencing throughout the Steilhang portion of this course en route to a second-place finish. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this course in Kitzbühel that hosts a World Cup Circuit race most recently won by Beat Feuz (“BEE-at foe-its”). In 2016, high winds moved the start of a race on this course down 40 metres to the top of its Mausefalle (“Mouse-fall”).

ANSWER: the Streif at Hahnenkamm [prompt on Hahnenkamm; prompt on but DO NOT REVEAL the downhill at Hahnenkamm]

[10] The Streif is used at Hahnenkamm for this alpine skiing discipline. Non-competitive skiers may refer to all alpine skiing by the name of this non-slalom discipline.

ANSWER: the downhill

[10] Athletes from this country have won the downhill at Hahnenkamm three times in the last six years including in 2019. Dominik Paris represented this country when he finished fourth in the downhill at the 2018 Winter Olympics.

ANSWER: Italy

<Olympics, ZB>

13. Since 2008, one World Championship in this sport has been held every December in London's "Ally Pally". For 10 points each:

[10] Name this sport brought to the big stage by the PDC. In the "501" ("five-O-one") version of this sport, players must end on a double or the inner bullseye to win a leg.

ANSWER: **darts** [accept **dart-throwing**]

[10] This Welsh darts player defeated two-time world champion Gary Anderson to become the 2021 PDC World Darts Champion. He currently ranks first on the PDC Order of Merit.

ANSWER: Gerwyn **Price**

[10] At the 2021 PDC World Darts Championship, James Wade accomplished this feat with an outshot of Triple-20, Triple-19, Double-12. This feat was accomplished twice by Phil Taylor in the 2010 Premier League Darts Final. A specific term is required.

ANSWER: **nine-dart** finish [accept **nine-darter**]

<Other, BW>

14. Before accepting the Jacksonville head coaching job, Urban Meyer had great success in the college game.

Answer some questions about his career for 10 points each:

[10] In 2014, Meyer coached this school's football team to a national championship. This school blew out Wisconsin 59-0 in the 2014 Big Ten Championship Game.

ANSWER: The **Ohio State** University [accept the **Buckeyes**; prompt on **OSU**; do not prompt on or accept "Ohio University"]

[10] Meyer won his first college football championship with this person starting at quarterback. In his senior year, this player passed Danny Wuerffel ("wur-full") in career passing yards at Wuerffel's alma mater.

ANSWER: Chris **Leak**

[10] Urban Meyer left this school to coach Chris Leak and the Florida Gators. In the 2005 Fiesta Bowl, Alex Smith threw four touchdown passes for this school, resulting in a 28-point victory over Pitt.

ANSWER: the University of **Utah** [accept the University of Utah **Utes**]

<College, TS>

15. Answer some questions about the touchdown targets of Steve Young. For 10 points each:

[10] In his career, this receiver caught 85 touchdown passes thrown by Young. In 1994, this player passed Jim Brown to become the all-time NFL leader in touchdowns scored.

ANSWER: Jerry **Rice**

[10] With Rice and Terrell Owens, this player formed a trio Young connected with for a combined 27 touchdown passes in 1998. During a Monday Night Football game against the Broncos, Bill Romanowski spit in this receiver's face.

ANSWER: J.J. **Stokes**

[10] Although not targeted often, this fullback caught a touchdown pass thrown by Young in Super Bowl XXIX ("29"). This player was given his nickname after his agent supposedly called him "the best fullback in football, bar none".

ANSWER: William **Floyd**

<Gridiron, ZB>

16. Sergey Lomanov Jr. was the first player to reach 1000 points in this sport's Russian Super League. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this only demonstration sport at the 1952 Winter Olympics. This stick and ball game whose "World Cup" is dominated by Swedish and Russian clubs is played in two 45-minute halves.

ANSWER: **bandy**

[10] Before 2012 and since 2018, the Elitserien, Sweden's top-tier professional bandy league, has hosted its final game in this city. A bandy team from this city won the Swedish Bandy Championships nine times in the 1910s.

ANSWER: **Uppsala**

[10] Like bandy, this sport played on ice uses an eponymous stick. This sport's free play lines are situated just inside each blue line and athletes in this sport's NHL compete for the Jeanne Sauvé Memorial Cup.

ANSWER: **ringette**

<Other, EC>

17. In the first round of the 2009 playoffs, this NBA team posted the largest margin of victory in a playoff game in league history. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this team, featuring Chauncey Billups and Chris “Birdman” Andersen, that beat the New Orleans Hornets 121-63 in that game. This team won that series but went on to lose the 2009 Western Conference Finals to the Lakers.

ANSWER: the Denver **Nuggets**

[10] This forward, who the Nuggets picked third overall in the 2003 draft, scored 26 points in that playoff rout. In 2021, he moved up to ninth on the all-time NBA points leaderboard while playing for the Lakers.

ANSWER: Carmelo **Anthony** [prompt on **Melo**]

[10] This power forward and 2000 first overall pick started alongside Melo in that game. He played seven seasons with the Nuggets before spending a year with the Flying Tigers in the Chinese Basketball Association

ANSWER: Kenyon **Martin**

<Basketball, BW>

18. Answer some questions about the long and storied history of the Vegas Golden Knights. For 10 points each:

[10] In the Knights’ inaugural season, this player won the Lady Byng Trophy and scored a team-leading 43 goals, still a franchise record. Vegas picked this centre from the Columbus Blue Jackets in the expansion draft.

ANSWER: **William Karlsson** [accept Lars **William Karlsson**; prompt on **Karlsson**]

[10] This Golden Knight won the Mark Messier Leadership Award in 2018 for his efforts in the local community following the 2017 Vegas shooting. This Vegas defenseman announced his retirement in 2020.

ANSWER: Deryk **Engelland**

[10] This much-hyped Russian centre only played three games for the Knights before being suspended for failing to report to their AHL affiliate. Shortly after, this player became the first NHL player to retire as a Knight.

ANSWER: Vadim **Shipachyov** (“SHIP-uh-CHOFF”)

<Hockey, LO>

19. A back injury led Rafael Palmeiro to replace Jose Canseco in one team’s starting lineup for this game played at Fenway Park. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this game whose AL starters included a battery of MVP Iván Rodríguez and Cy Young award winner Pedro Martínez. Pedro Martínez struck out the first three batters he faced in this game, becoming the first person to begin a game of its type by striking out the side.

ANSWER: the **1999 MLB All-Star Game** [prompt on **MLB All-Star Game** with “in which year?”]

[10] This person threw out the ceremonial first pitch at the 1999 MLB All-Star Game. In 1941, this person finished second to Joe DiMaggio in AL MVP voting despite hitting for a .406 (“four-oh-six”) average.

ANSWER: Ted **Williams**

[10] This umpire called balls and strikes for the 1999 MLB All-Star Game. After losing his job in the MLUA mass resignation, this umpire’s “Academy of Professional Umpiring” held a partnership with the MiLB (“M-I-L-B”) for 12 years.

ANSWER: Jim **Evans**

<Baseball, ZB>

20. The Derby della Mole is contested between two teams from this city. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this city home to Juventus. Valentino Mazzola was the “number 10” of this city’s namesake club that dominated Italian football in the 1940s.

ANSWER: **Torino** [or **Turin**]

[10] In 1949, Mazzola, along with nearly all of the “Grande Torino”, were killed in this event. This event occurred on Torino’s trip home from a friendly against S.L. Benfica.

ANSWER: **Superga** Air Disaster [accept **Superga** plane crash; prompt on **plane crash** or equivalents]

[10] Twenty-five years after the death of “Grande Torino”, Toro won the 1975-76 scudetto under the management of this person. Facing potential relegation in 1980, this person was replaced by Ercole Rabitti as Torino’s manager.

ANSWER: Luigi **Radice** (“ra-DEE-chee”)
