TOSSUPS:

1. **Armando Calero once ruled that a team presided over by Enric Marti had to share a player with this club. In a cup semi-final allegedly tainted by political influence, this club defeated that team 11-1 after losing the first leg 3-0 (“three nil”). While playing for this club, one player became the first and only person to score four goals in a European Cup Final; this club won that Cup Final 7-3 over (*) Eintracht Frankfurt. In 1966, this club became the first to win a European Cup with only domestic players. Members of that squad, this club’s Yé-yé generation, included Manolo Sanchis and Pirri. For 10 points, name this club that won the first five European Cups with Alfredo di Stefano under the presidency of Santiago Bernabéu (“BURN-uh-BAY-o”).**

ANSWER: **Real Madrid** [prompt on **Madrid**; do not prompt on or accept “Atlético Madrid”]

2. **This athlete was fined for speeding in the pit lane nine seconds into his F1 career, setting the record for the shortest time elapsed before receiving a penalty. With “Hungry Heidi”, this person won the 2013 Malaysian Grand Prix. At the 2012 Abu Dhabi Grand Prix, a fuel violation led this driver to be moved to the back of the start. Despite that poor starting position, this driver finished the race in third place. At the (*) 2008 Italian Grand Prix, this driver snatched Toro Rosso’s first F1 victory. Between 2010 and 2013, this driver won four consecutive championships with Red Bull. At the end of the 2020 season, this driver left Ferrari to become a teammate of Lance Stroll. For 10 points, name this German driver currently racing with the Aston Martin.**

ANSWER: Sebastian **Vettel**

3. **At a race held in this country, Khalid Skah was disqualified for team racing with Hammou Boutayeb before being re-declared champion the following day. This country won its first Olympic running medal after Joseph Chesire was passed during the final lap of the 1500 metres by Fermín Cacho. Vitaly Scherbo won four gold medals in gymnastics on the same day at an Olympics hosted by this country. After tearing his (*) hamstring at that Olympics in this country, Derek Redmond used his father as a crutch to complete a semi-final of the 400-metre dash. For 10 points, name this country where Christian Laettner and Charles Barkley won their first Olympic medals as members of the 1992 Dream Team.**

ANSWER: **Spain** [or **Espana**]

4. **During one Super Bowl, this team’s punter made a one-handed jumping catch to retrieve the ball after a high snap from tight end Todd Christensen. Mike Shanahan made his NFL head coaching debut after this team’s head coach moved to its front office; that coach of this team was Tom Flores. A running back who played for this team reversed field and avoided two tackles as part of a (*) 74-yard Super Bowl touchdown run; that player on this team was named MVP of Super Bowl XVIII (“18”). This team’s owner signed another running back to a contract that allowed that back to continue playing for the Kansas City Royals. For 10 points, name this team whose late-80s rosters included Bo Jackson and Marcus Allen.**

ANSWER: the Los Angeles **Raiders** [accept the Oakland **Raiders**; accept the Las Vegas **Raiders**; prompt on **Los Angeles**; do not prompt on or accept “Oakland” or “Las Vegas”]

5. **This moment ranked number one on an AP plays of the year list which included Brooke Henderson’s first major title win and a Dee Strange-Gordon home run. This moment was preceded by a missed floater off a hop-step whose rebound was grabbed by the defense as the time on the clock ran down below two minutes. This play’s central figure, who had a 27-point triple double in the game, recalled thinking (*) “J.R., please don’t foul him, I know I’m there” before executing this play. This play kept the game in an 89-89 tie that was broken by a three-pointer from Kyrie Irving. For 10 points, name this moment in which a Warriors forward was denied at the backboard in Game 7 of the 2016 NBA finals.**

ANSWER: **the block** [accept descriptions of **LeBron James blocking** Andre Iguodala]

6. In 1998, a group of three players nicknamed “the Meeks” led their team to its third consecutive championship at this tournament. The University of Maryland won this tournament for the first time in 2006. In 2017, Morgan William scored on a last second shot to advance to this tournament’s final. Swin Cash played for a team coached by Geno (*) Auriemma that won this tournament to cap off an undefeated season in 2002. Pat Summit coached Tennessee to each of their eight championships at this tournament. In a 102-54 victory against Army, Candace Parker became the first person to dunk in this tournament. For 10 points, name this tournament won a record 11 times by the UConn Huskies.

ANSWER: the NCAA Division 1 Women’s Basketball Tournament [accept the Women’s March Madness tournament or equivalents; accept the Women’s College Basketball Tournament or equivalents; prompt on the NCAA Division 1 Basketball Tournament; prompt on the Division 1 College Basketball Tournament; do not prompt on or accept “March Madness” or answers that mention the “Final Four”]

7. This player became the oldest player with a multi-homer game when he hit two against the Twins in 2006. This player, the AL comeback player of the year in 2000, routinely swung a rusty piece of rebar in the on-deck circle. This player’s image is included on the left field wall of an MLB ballpark next to Billy Pierce and below text which commemorates a DeWayne (“Dwayne”) (*) Wise catch. This right-handed hitter hit his 500th career home run while playing for the Blue Jays in 2007. This player won back-to-back MVPs in 1993 and 1994 while playing his home games at Comiskey Park. For 10 points, name this first baseman and designated hitter nicknamed the “Big Hurt” who spent 15 years with the Chicago White Sox.

ANSWER: Frank Thomas [prompt on the Big Hurt until mentioned]

8. One player on this team stole the puck from a “puddle of water” to intercept a Frank Mahovlich pass and score the game-winner of a 1973 playoff game. Earlier in that game, Simon Nolet scored twice for this team. Kate Smith made a punching motion after singing God Bless America in this team’s first Finals appearance. This team’s “LCB” line featured a right winger who won the 1974 (*) Conn Smythe trophy despite being swept in the Finals by Montreal; that player was Reggie Leach. This team won back-to-back Stanley Cups with goaltender Bernie Parent (“puh-RONT”). For 10 points, name this team, nicknamed the Broad Street Bullies in the 1970s that won two Stanley Cups with Bobby Clarke.

ANSWER: the Philadelphia Flyers [accept either underlined part]

9. A coach with this surname cited “too much Zabel” as the reason for a loss to the Beloit Fairies that ruined an undefeated season. It’s not Lambeau, but that coach with this surname was the first head coach of the Green Bay Packers. Another coach with this surname was appointed defensive coordinator of the Cleveland Browns in Eric Mangini’s first season as head coach. That coach with this last name was linebackers coach for New England’s first two (*) Championship teams. The Bills made their first playoff appearance since 1999 after firing a head coach with this last name. That defensive-minded coach beat the Patriots in a 2011 AFC Divisional Round game with a team quarterbacked by Mark Sanchez. For 10 points, give this surname of NFL coaching brothers Rob and Rex.

ANSWER: Ryan [accept Willard Ryan; accept Rex Ryan; accept Rob Ryan; do not prompt on or accept “Buddy Ryan”]

10. To defend his controversial behaviour in this race, Kent Desormeaux (“duh-SORE-moe”) used the phrase “Hear me roar. He was not sore”. In the 1999 running of this race, Chris Antley held one competitor’s leg after they broke two bones near the finish line. John Velasquez won this race for the first time in 2007 and Smarty Jones was tracked down from behind in the final stretch of this race in 2004. Another winner of this race was described as (*) “moving like a tremendous machine” in 1973 en route to this race’s largest-ever margin of victory, thirty-one lengths. Victory Gallop defeated Real Quiet in a photo finish at this race which has measured a mile and a half for most of its history. For 10 points, name this third and last race in American horse racing's triple crown.

ANSWER: the Belmont stakes [prompt on the Test of the Champion; prompt on the Run for the Carnations]

11. **On the first offensive play of this event's 2013 edition, Terrell Floyd scored on a Pick Six. An interception caught by Solomon Thomas secured Ohio State's victory in the 2011 edition of this event. Barry Krauss was knocked unconscious during the fourth down of a goal line stand in the 1979 edition of this game. Prior to 1975, every edition of this bowl game had been played at the third Tulane Stadium. Phil Brady ran for a first down on a (*) fake punt in the only edition of this bowl game played at the Georgia Dome. West Virginia defeated the University of Georgia in that edition of this bowl game. Bear Bryant's only loss in this bowl game came in 1973 when Notre Dame defeated Alabama. For 10 points, name this New Year's Six bowl game usually played in New Orleans.**

ANSWER: the Sugar Bowl

12. **After scoring a goal against Chievo ("KEY-eh-vo"), one of this club's players flashed the crowd with a shirt that read "Sorry for the delay". That player received one of his nicknames from announcer Carlo Zampa, a known supporter of this club. This team defeated Qarabag one-nil to advance to the knockout stage of the 2017-2018 UEFA Champions League. That match's winning goal was scored by (*) Diego Perotti. This club reached its first ever Champions League semi-final in 2018 after defeating Barcelona three-nil. Napoli plays against this club in the "Derby del Sole" and Mohammed Salah transferred from this club to Liverpool in the 2017 summer transfer window. Daniele De Rossi played most of his career with, for 10 points, which club that holds a bitter rivalry with Lazio?**

ANSWER: A.S. Roma [accept AS Rome]

13. **This athlete finished second in the event that brought Chad Hedrick the only Olympic gold medal of his career. In a semi-final race at the Turin Olympics, this athlete accidentally caused the crash of Carl Verheijen ("verr-HAY-in"). In 2020, Marcel Bosker raced on a team with this athlete that broke the Team Pursuit World record. Gerard Kemkers wrongly guided this athlete to change lanes in a (*) 10,000 metre race at the Vancouver Olympics, leading to this athlete's disqualification. In Pyeongchang, this person set an Olympic record in the 5000 metres, an event this person has won at the last three Winter Olympic Games. For 10 points, name this Dutchman with nine gold medals at the World Allround Speed Skating Championships.**

ANSWER: Sven Kramer

14. **It's not the Chicago Cubs, but this MLB franchise played its first season at Wrigley Field. This team traded All-Star Jim Fregosi to the Mets in 1971. This franchise made it to its first ALCS in 1979 behind an MVP season from Don Baylor. This franchise completed a 5-run comeback in Game 6 of its first World Series appearance when Garret Anderson and (*) Chone Figgins scored on a double hit by Troy Glaus. Figgins entered that game as a pinch-runner for Tim Salmon ("Sammin"), who played his entire career with this franchise. This team was managed to its only World Series title by Mike Scioscia ("SO-shuh") in 2002. For 10 points, name this franchise whose current roster includes Anthony Rendon ("ren-DOAN") and Shohei Ohtani.**

ANSWER: the Los Angeles Angels [prompt on Los Angeles; accept California Angels; accept Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim; accept Anaheim Angels]

15. **This competition was won in 2019 on a game-winning goal scored by Peter Abbandonato and assisted by Jakub Lauko. In 2008, Dustin Tokarski made 53 saves in this tournament's final to carry his team to victory. Adam Dennis earned a shutout in the 2005 final of this tournament. In that year, the tournament MVP was awarded to Corey Perry. (*) Nathan MacKinnon scored a hat trick in the 2013 final of this tournament to lead his team to their only tournament title. In 2016, Matthew Tkachuk ("ka-CHUCK") scored a game-winning overtime goal to win this tournament for the London Knights. For 10 points, name this tournament competed between a host team and the champions of the QMJHL, WHL, and OHL to crown Canada's major junior hockey champions.**

ANSWER: the Memorial Cup

16. In one series, fans of this team threw bottles into the outfield after an umpire ruled Cliff McWatt out. This team hosted that series at a stadium nicknamed the “Bourda”. Before a 1976 series, Tony Greig said he “intended to make [this team] grovel” and Lawrence Rowe captained this team during its rebel tours of South Africa. Gordon Greenidge scored 214 for this team to win the second test of the 1984 (*) “Blackwash” series. After the dismissal of Rob Bailey, this team’s captain caused controversy with his “finger flapping” appeal. The only captain of this team to never lose a test series was that captain, Viv Richards. Curtly Ambrose and Malcolm Marshall bowled for, for 10 points, what multi-national cricket team?

ANSWER: the West Indies cricket team [accept The Windies]

17. This quarterback won the first NFL game played at Twickenham stadium. In another season, two punt returns fumbled by Kyle Williams allowed this quarterback to reach the Super Bowl. This player completed a 32-yard pass on a play called in the huddle as “62 sail-Y union”. Jeremy Shockey caught the first touchdown pass of this player’s career. Nate Kaeding was selected with a third-round draft pick (*) acquired in a deal that sent this player to the team where he played his whole NFL career. Steve Spagnuolo was hired as an interim head coach in 2017 after this player was benched in favour of Geno Smith by Ben McAdoo. For 10 points, name this quarterback who threw a game-winning touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress in Super Bowl XLII (“42”).

ANSWER: Eli Manning [prompt on Manning; do not prompt on or accept “Peyton Manning” or “Archie Manning”]

18. With Adolf Stelzer in this role, a Swiss team managed by Karl Rappan upset Germany at the 1938 World Cup. More recently, Traianos Dellas occupied this role on the Greek team that won the 2004 Euros. Armando Picchi captained his side to two European Cups while playing this position for (*) Helenio Herrera’s “Grande Inter” team. A more offensive variation of this position used to build counterattacks and distribute the ball was pioneered by players such as Gaetano Scirea and Franz Beckenbauer. In modern tactical systems, some goalkeepers like Manuel Neuer (“NOY-er”) play a version of this role. For 10 points, name this type of centre-back who plays as a last man, popularized by the catenaccio system.

ANSWER: sweeper [accept libero, prompt on centre-back, centre-half, or central defender, do not prompt on or accept “defender”]

19. Bubba Wells executed this strategy in a 1997 game where he set an NBA record by exiting the game after only three minutes of play. An early form of this strategy resulted in a game of tag on the court between opposing players and Wilt Chamberlain. The NBA discussed a rule change following the extensive use of this strategy by the Trailblazers and the Pacers in the 2000 playoffs. (*) Don Nelson innovated this strategy by creating a legitimate defensive tactic out of a common clock-stopping technique. This strategy has been used on Dwight Howard, allowing him to set the NBA record for free throw attempts in a game with 39. For 10 points, name this strategy, named for a Lakers center, where team intentionally foul a poor free throw shooter.

ANSWER: Hack-a-Shaq [accept Hack-a-Rodman or Hack-a-Howard until “Lakers center”; prompt on descriptions of intentionally fouling a poor free throw shooter until “Lakers center”]

20. In one event at the 1995 edition of this competition, Nathan Jones broke his arm. A different event at the 2017 edition of this competition used an object shaped like an elephant’s head. A “double dip” at that edition of this competition led referee Colin Bryce to give that competition’s eventual silver medallist a score of 14. Brian Shaw has finished in the top three at this competition 10 times since 2008 and Žydrūnas (*) Savickas leads this competition in career medals. In 2018, Eddie Hall failed to defend his title at this competition, losing to rival Hafthor Björnsson. For 10 points, name this competition whose events sometimes include the Atlas Stones and the Vehicle Pull.

ANSWER: World’s Strongest Man

BONUSES:

1. Former Rookie of the Year Emeka Okafor recorded ten blocks in a game against the New York Knicks as a member of this team. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this team that drafted Kemba Walker in 2011. Walker leads this franchise in career points.

ANSWER: the **Charlotte Bobcats** [accept either underlined part; accept the Charlotte **Hornets**; accept **New Orleans Hornets**; do not accept or prompt on “New Orleans”]

[10] After being drafted second overall in 1992, this center played three seasons with Charlotte. In a 1993 playoff series, this rookie hit a game-winning buzzer beater to defeat the Boston Celtics.

ANSWER: Alonzo **Mourning**

[10] In 2016, 28 points from Troy Daniels led Charlotte to a double overtime victory against the Kings in a game given this name. In 2021, 42 points from P.J. Washington and a game-winner from Malik Monk led Charlotte to beat the Kings again in a game sometimes called this game’s sequel.

ANSWER: The **Miracle after Midnight**

2. Larry Pleau was selected to three all-star games as a representative of this team. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this team that retired the number two in honour of defenseman Rick Ley. This team, which signed Gordie Howe and his sons in 1977, made it to the Avco Cup finals in 1978 before joining the NHL in 1979.

ANSWER: the **New England Whalers** [accept either underlined part; accept **Hartford Whalers**]

[10] Before the trio signed with the Whalers, Gordie Howe and his sons won the 1974 and 1975 Avco Cups as members of this team. This team, originally slated to play in Dayton, folded in 1978 before the NHL-WHA merger.

ANSWER: the **Houston Aeros**

[10] This team, captained by Lars-Erik Sjöberg (“SHOW-berg”), defeated the Whalers in the 1978 Avco Cup Finals. This team won the Avco Cup again in 1979 with a “hot line” featuring wingers Anders Hedberg and Ulf Nilsson.

ANSWER: the **Winnipeg Jets** [accept either underlined part]

3. It may not have been pretty, but this Marlins pitcher did throw a no-hitter in 2001. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this starter who walked nine batters and allowed each of the Padres position players to reach base in his no-hitter. In a perhaps equally impressive feat that same year, this pitcher got a warm-up pitch stuck in the window of a truck.

ANSWER: A.J. **Burnett**

[10] The Marlins were limited to no hits themselves when Roy Halladay threw his perfect game against them in 2010, a game in which Florida started this pitcher. In 2010, this righty led the NL in ERA, finishing fifth in Cy Young voting.

ANSWER: Josh **Johnson**

[10] This young Marlins star never threw a no hitter in his short four-year career, which ended with his tragic death in a boating accident. He was the 2013 NL Rookie of the Year and made the all-star team in two of his four major league seasons.

ANSWER: José **Fernández**

4. Answer some questions about the single greatest element of the college sports atmosphere, marching bands. For 10 points each:

[10] After this school lost to NC State during March Madness, video of a crying piccolo player in this school’s pep band was broadcast on the jumbotron. Rollie Massimino led this school to its first NCAA title in 1985.

ANSWER: **Villanova** University [prompt on **Nova**]

[10] This school has the oldest continuously operating marching band of any college in the United States. The lyrics to this school’s “victory march” instruct the listener to “Shake down the thunder from the sky” and “Cheer Cheer” for this school.

ANSWER: The University of **Notre Dame** [accept **old Notre Dame**]

[10] A solo trumpet plays the first half of the Star-Spangled Banner without accompaniment in the arrangement played by this school’s Junior University Marching Band. During “The Play”, this school’s band ran on the field.

ANSWER: **Stanford** University

5. Answer some questions about the club that was said to have “Won the World Cup” in 1966. For 10 points each:
[10] Name this Premier League club based in East London that shares a bitter rivalry with Millwall F.C. This team moved to London Stadium in 2016 after playing at Boleyn Ground for 112 years.

ANSWER: **West Ham** United

[10] During his tenure with West Ham, this player scored 249 goals, making him the team’s all-time second-highest goal scorer. He is also the only person to score a hattrick in a FIFA Men’s World Cup Final.

ANSWER: Geoff **Hurst**

[10] This 1918 song is regarded as the anthem of West Ham United. West Ham supporters sing this song prior to kickoff while sometimes performing the titular action.

ANSWER: “I’m Forever **Blowing Bubbles**”

6. Answer some questions about Kenyan track and field athletes. For 10 points each:

[10] The “Ineos 1:59 (“one fifty-nine”) Challenge” was constructed for Kenyan Eliud Kipchoge to break the world record in this discipline. In 2008, Samuel Wanjiru represented Kenya when winning the Olympic edition of this event.

ANSWER: the **marathon**

[10] After Rashid Ramzi failed a doping test, this Kenyan won the 1500 metres at the 2008 Beijing Olympics. This person received a four-year doping ban in 2019 after testing positive for ERO.

ANSWER: Asbel **Kiprop**

[10] Kenyan Julius Yego won this event at the 2015 IAAF World Championships. Yego won a silver medal in this event at the Rio Olympics despite only recording one attempt in the final round.

ANSWER: **javelin**

7. Answer some questions about the many chip-in birdies at the Masters. For 10 points each:

[10] This player chipped in for birdie on the 16th hole after flying the green in the final round of the 2005 Masters. This golfer traditionally wears a red shirt during the final round of tournaments.

ANSWER: **Tiger Woods** [accept either underlined part; accept Eldrick **Woods**]

[10] Greg Norman’s missed 20-foot putt on the final hole of the 1987 Masters forced him to enter a playoff with Seve Ballesteros (“seh-vee buy-uh-STEH-ros”) and this player. This player won the 1987 Masters after chipping in on the second playoff hole.

ANSWER: Larry **Mize**

[10] After hitting the flagstick and rolling to just off the green, this player chipped-in on the 72nd hole of the 2011 Masters. Though he didn’t win the Masters, this golfer topped the European Tour and PGA Tour Money lists in 2011.

ANSWER: Luke **Donald**

8. In 1999, this country won the last Five Nations Championship with a team featuring Alan Tait and Gregor Townsend. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this country that competes against England for the oldest trophy in international rugby, the Calcutta Cup. This country avoided the Wooden Spoon at the 2010 Six Nations Cup by defeating Ireland with the help of their “Killer ‘B’s”.

ANSWER: **Scotland**

[10] This South African-born Scottish wing scored the only try of the 2021 Calcutta Cup. While playing for Edinburgh in the Pro14, this wing was named Player of the Season for the 2019-2020 Season.

ANSWER: **Duhan van der Merwe** (“DOO-han van der MURR-vuh”) [prompt on **van der Merwe**]

[10] *Immediately* before joining Edinburgh, van der Merwe played club rugby for a team in this country. Former captains of this country’s national team include Raphael Ibañez and Serge Blanco.

ANSWER: **France**

9. Eddie Collins played second base for this team's \$100,000 Infield. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this team for which "Shoeless" Joe Jackson made his MLB debut. Before the 1911 season, this team's manager Connie Mack decided to replace Harry Davis at first base with Stuffy McInnis.

ANSWER: the Philadelphia **Athletics** [or Philadelphia **A's**; prompt on Philadelphia; do not accept or prompt on "Oakland"]

[10] This man played third base in Philadelphia's \$100,000 Infield. This player earned his nickname for going yard twice in the 1911 World Series to carry the Athletics over the New York Giants.

ANSWER: Home Run **Baker** [or Frank **Baker**]

[10] A picture taken by The Detroit News vindicated this player after he was accused of spiking "Home Run" Baker during a 1909 game while sliding into third base. This player holds the MLB record for highest career batting average.

ANSWER: Ty **Cobb**

10. Answer some questions about some of the Edmonton Oilers' first round draft picks of the 2010s. For 10 points each:

[10] This player, named CHL Rookie of the Year as a member of the Sarnia Sting, was the first overall pick for the Oilers in 2012. This player was later traded to the St. Louis Blues in exchange for Zach Pochiro and a draft pick.

ANSWER: Nail **Yakupov**

[10] The Oilers were a little luckier with this player, their third overall pick in 2014. This centre won the Hart and Art Ross trophies in 2020, racking up 110 points and leading Edmonton to the playoffs.

ANSWER: Leon **Draisaitl** ("DRY-sigh-tull")

[10] Edmonton's first round pick in the 2017 Draft was this player from the Spokane Chiefs. Standing at 5'8", this right winger is the shortest first-round pick in NHL history.

ANSWER: Kailer **Yamamoto**

11. Kobe and Michael weren't the only players of their era to make an impact at their position. Name some other notable shooting guards of the 90s and 2000s. For 10 points each:

[10] This "Knick killer" once scored eight points in nine seconds in a playoff game at Madison Square Garden. This Pacers guard lost the 1998 Eastern Conference Finals to Jordan's Bulls and the 2000 NBA Finals to Kobe's Lakers.

ANSWER: Reggie **Miller** [or Reginald **Miller**]

[10] This Knick was guarding Miller during his 8 points in 9 seconds. In the 1993 Eastern Conference Finals, this shooting guard dunked on Horace Grant in the face of Michael Jordan in a moment known by Knicks fans as "the dunk".

[10] The Knicks traded John Starks to Golden State in 1999 and received this shooting guard in return. This shooting guard may be better remembered for choking coach P.J. Carlesimo during a 1997 practice.

ANSWER: Latrell **Sprewell** ("SPREE-well")

12. They are the Bears shufflin' crew, shufflin' on down, doin' it for you. On top of being a Grammy nominated R&B group, the 1985 Bears were also a pretty good football team. Answer some questions about their defense for 10 points each:

[10] This rookie defensive tackle "may be large but he's no dumb cookie". He rushed for 7 yards and 2 touchdowns in 1985. In Super Bowl XX ("20"), he broke the record for heaviest player to score a touchdown in the Super Bowl.

ANSWER: William **Perry** [accept the **Refrigerator**; accept the **Fridge**]

[10] The sackman's comin'! This defensive end was named MVP of Super Bowl XX ("20"). This player also led the NFL in 1985 with 17 sacks.

ANSWER: Richard **Dent**

[10] This man is here and he's "Mr. Clean, they call [him] "hit man", don't know what they mean". This free safety is the Bears all-time leader in interceptions and takeaways.

ANSWER: Gary **Fencik** [or John Gary **Fencik**]

[10] The Thunder traded Paul George to this team for a package which included five future first rounders. Kawhi Leonard joined forces with George on this team which lost to the Nuggets in the second round of the 2020 playoffs.

ANSWER: the Los Angeles **Clippers** [prompt on Los Angeles]

[10] The package the Thunder received for Paul George included Shai Gilgeous-Alexander and this forward. This forward currently plays alongside Trae Young with the Hawks.

ANSWER: Danilo **Gallinari**

[10] OKC traded Jerami Grant to acquire the 25th overall pick in the 2020 draft, which they used to select this player. This player's draft rights were then traded along with Ricky Rubio for the draft rights to Aleksey Pokusevski ("Alek-SAY poh-koo-SHEV-skee")

ANSWER: Immanuel **Quickley**

14. Answer some questions about Austria's dominant performances at ski competitions during the 1997 – 1998 season. For 10 points each:

[10] Under the leadership of this coach, the Austrian men's ski team won gold in every discipline of the FIS 1997-1998 Alpine World Cup. In 1999, Toni Giger succeeded this coach as head coach of Austria's Men's ski team.

ANSWER: Werner **Margreiter**

[10] This alpine skier coached by Margreiter crashed during his downhill run at the Nagano Olympics. After crashing in that event, this skier came back unharmed earning him the nickname "The Herminator".

ANSWER: Hermann **Maier**

[10] Fog and rain delayed this skiing event at the Nagano Olympics by two days, allowing Maier to recuperate from his crash and participate. Maier won his first Olympic gold medal at this "speed" event with a time of 1:34.82.

ANSWER: **super-G** [or Men's **Super Giant Slalom**; do not accept nor prompt on "Giant Slalom" or "Slalom"]

15. The 1998 MLB season featured a legendary home run chase between these *two* players. For 10 points each:

[10] Name these two players, a Cubs outfielder and a Cardinals first baseman, who both passed the single-season home run record that year, with 66 and 70 home runs respectively. Unsurprisingly, these two players also finished first and second in 1998 NL MVP voting.

ANSWER: Mark **McGwire** and Sammy **Sosa** [accept in either order; do not accept or prompt on answers which don't give both names]

[10] The previous record for home runs was set by Roger Maris who hit this number of home runs in his MVP season. Some claim that this is the true single-season home run record since it has only been surpassed by players with links to performance-enhancing drugs.

ANSWER: **61**

[10] In 1994, Ken Griffey Jr. and this Giants third baseman were on pace to break Maris' record before the season was cut short by a strike. This later manager of the Washington Nationals hit 43 home runs in 1994.

ANSWER: Matt **Williams**

16. Answer some questions about World Records set the London 2012 Olympic Games. For 10 points each:

[10] Despite an early elimination, one archer from this country set a World record at the London Olympics with a 699-point performance in the ranking round. At those Olympics, this country won Archery's Men's Team event.

ANSWER: **South Korea** [accept **Republic of Korea**, do not accept or prompt on "Korea" or "Democratic People's Republic of Korea"]

[10] South Korean Kim Jangmi set an Olympic record in one of this sport's disciplines at the London Olympics. In another of this sport's disciplines, Jessica Rossi won a gold medal after setting a World record in the 2012 Olympic final.

ANSWER: **shooting** [accept **trap** shooting; accept **25-metre pistol** shooting]

[10] With a time of 36.84 seconds, a Jamaican team featuring Nesta Carter and Yohan Blake broke the World record in this event at the 2012 Olympics. At those Olympics, Ryan Bailey ran anchor for the American team in this event.

ANSWER: **Men's 4x100-metre relay** [prompt on **400-metre relay**; prompt on **4x100-metre relay** with "What gender?"]

17. This NHL player and his teammate and fellow countryman Jiří Hrdina (“HEE-ree er-DEE-na”) were often promoted together as the “Czechmates” For 10 points each:

[10] Name this forward drafted fifth overall by the Penguins in 1990. Between 1980 and 2001, Wayne Gretzky, Mario Lemieux, and this player were the only three people to win the Art Ross trophy.

ANSWER: Jaromir **Jagr** (“YA-ger”)

[10] This left winger played with Jagr and Lemieux on the “Sky Line” during their consecutive cup wins. He scored over 100 points in both the ‘91-’92 and ‘93-’94 seasons.

ANSWER: Kevin **Stevens**

[10] This goalie and former Vezina winner was a big factor during the Penguins’ back-to-back wins. This American netminder holds the records for most career points by a goaltender, with 48.

ANSWER: Tom **Barrasso**

18. Answer some questions about sporting venues in Detroit. For 10 points each:

[10] Prior to the 2018 NHL season, the Detroit Red Wings played at an arena named after this person. After losing a fight to Max Schmelling in 1936, this boxer retained his World Heavyweight title in a rematch two years later.

ANSWER: Joe **Louis**

[10] The Lions moved back to Detroit proper when they left this stadium for Ford Field. This stadium, which hosted Super Bowl XVI (“16”) and games of the 1994 FIFA World Cup served as the home of the Pistons for most of the 1980s.

ANSWER: The Pontiac **Silverdome**

[10] Detroit’s Cadieux (“cad-yeuh”) Café is the only place in the United States where this sport can be played. Steve Gosskie was the 2013 Cadieux Café Grand Champion of this sport played by rolling wooden discs shaped like wheels of cheese.

ANSWER: **feather bowling** [accept **trabollen**]

19. Answer some questions about the playoff woes of the Cincinnati Bengals for 10 points each:

[10] In Cincinnati’s most recent playoff appearance, this player instigated a fight with four opposing players after a questionable hit on Giovani Bernard. Later in that game, this player fumbled the ball on the first play after a Vontaze Burfict interception.

ANSWER: Jeremy **Hill**

[10] The Bengals lost that 2016 playoff game to this team. In a 2006 playoff loss to this team, Jon Kitna replaced an injured Carson Palmer after Cincinnati’s opening drive.

ANSWER: the **Pittsburgh Steelers** [accept either underlined part]

[10] Despite his lack of success in the playoffs, the Bengals kept this head coach for 16 seasons. By the time this coach was fired in 2018, he finished with an 0-7 (“O and seven”) record in the playoffs.

ANSWER: Marvin **Lewis**

20. Answer some questions about transfers involving the Chinese Super League. For 10 points each:

[10] In 2016, this player became the most expensive signing by an Asian club until Oscar signed a year later with Shanghai SIPG. The nickname of this Brazilian forward supposedly comes from his resemblance to Lou Ferrigno, who played this comic book character.

ANSWER: **Hulk** [accept **Givanildo Vieira de Sousa**]

[10] Shanghai SIPG’s all-time leading goalscorer is this winger, who made his professional debut at the age of 14. This forward on the Chinese National team transferred to Espanyol in 2019 for a reported fee of 2 million Euros.

ANSWER: **Wu Lei** [accept **Lei Wu**; prompt on **Wu**; do not prompt on or accept “Lei”]

[10] This club won a record eight Chinese Super League titles between 2011 and 2019. Paulinho moved from this club to Barcelona for one season before returning in 2018.

ANSWER: Guangzhou **Evergrande** [or **Guangzhou F.C.**; accept Guangzhou **Hengda**; prompt on **Guangzhou**; do not prompt on or accept “Guangzhou City”]
