

- 1) **This organization's highest award, the Wood Badge, was created by William Hillcourt, who was nicknamed "Green Bar Bill." Many members about to join this organization are given the "Arrow of Light" and join this organization after becoming Webelos. Pedro the (\*) Mailburro is the mascot of a magazine run by this organization whose members sell Trail's End Popcorn. This organization, whose members are supposed to "do a good turn daily," has recently started accepting females. For 10 points, name this organization that produces Eagle Scouts, famous for its camping and its *Boys Life Magazine*.**  
ANSWER: Scouts BSA [but like way more reasonably take Boy Scouts of America] <Brad>
  
- 2) **In an episode of *CatDog*, Cat tries to convince Dog to be more like him, after this happens when Dog has an accident chasing a garbage truck. After this happens to Scrooge McDuck, he gets a job at his own factory and tries to improve working conditions. Spongebob Squarepants winds up the (\*) mayor of New Kelp City after this happens to him. In the finale of *Full House*, this happens to Michelle after an accident riding a horse, and hitting her head. For 10 points, name this condition that seems to happen a lot on TV, after head bumps, where people forget who they are.**  
ANSWER: Amnesia [accept descriptive things like "forgetting who you are"] <Brad>
  
- 3) **Ancient Tablets of Knowledge can be attained in this game in places like the Avarice Chest in the Overgrown Ruins or in the Lost Cemetery after you defeat the Grave Digger. After Titan Souls, this game is the second released by Acid Nerve Games, and the secret ending reveals they share a universe. Souls are used in this game as a currency and to open the title object, you need to defeat Betty, the Witch of the Urns, and the King of the Swamps. For 10 points, name this 2021 game where you play as a crow, who serves as a reaper, who needs to collect three giant souls to open the title object.**  
ANSWER: Death's Door <Brad>
  
- 4) **The Pittsburgh Steelers were the first NFL team to do one of these events, in conjunction with the Pirates, in 1980, when they offered a certain person a Terrible Towel. One of these events got preempted by the Challenger Explosion, and the 1985 Bears did not do this event until (\*) 2011 when invited by a Chicago native. The Clemson football team was strangely served McDonalds during one of these events that took place in the State Dining Room, during the Trump tenure. For 10 points, name these events classically undertaken by championship-winning teams as they journey to D.C.**  
ANSWER: White House Visits [accept any equivalent that denotes that they know this is a team visiting the president in Washington D.C.] <Brad>
  
- 5) **Yusuf Islam receives royalties for an opening track by this band resembling his "Father and Son," and it ends with line "The test is over... now!" This band released a four CD album with the intention for the listener to play all four CDs at the same time. This band collaborated with one pop artist on the free album *Miley (\*) Cyrus and Her Dead Petz*. The acronym for one of this band's songs means "The Will Always Negates Defeat," and it is on the album *War Against the Mystics*. For 10 points, name this psychedelic rock band of *Yoshimi Battles the Pink Robots*.**  
ANSWER: Flaming Lips
  
- 6) **In an episode of *Fairly Odd Parents*, Cosmo turns into a clam to avoid taking this action. In *ChalkZone*, Snap wears a veil in order to bail out Rudy by taking this action. In *Father Brown*, a pilot, believed to have been deceased, miraculously comes back, just in time to do this action. In *The Odd Couple*, Felix cost Oscar more (\*) alimony payments by taking this action. In *How I Met Your Mother*, Scooter asked if he'd be able to take this action at Lily's wedding, and was told that a certain line is usually removed from the ceremony now. For 10 points, name this cliched disruptive action, rarely undertaken at real weddings.**

ANSWER: Saying something when the minister says “Speak Now or Forever Hold your peace”  
[prompt on “Breaking up a wedding” with “How” and accept basically anything more specific than that]

- 7) **This actor played Colonel Joll in a 2019 adaptation of a J.M. Coetzee novel directed by Ciro Guerra. In a film starring Marlon Brando, this man’s character dresses as Zorro and believes himself to be the reincarnation of Don Juan, the greatest lover. This man voiced a character who is told by the “Spirit of the West” that “No man can walk out on (\*) his own story” and that he had to correct the mistakes he made with the citizens of Dirt. That animated film is *Rango*. For 10 points, name this actor known for his roles as Edward Scissorhands and Jack Sparrow.**

ANSWER: Johnny **Depp**

- 8) **Musicians like Mac Lethal, Futuristic, and Luke Gawne feature in a viral song that is titled “Death to [this genre].” While on *Ebro in the Morning*, Wiz Khalifa popularized this term by using it to describe the “younger (\*) generation.” In “Killshot,” Eminem wrongly claims that Machine Gun Kelly is in this genre. In “Everybody Dies” by J Cole, he claims that these rappers “ride the short bus” and that they are using a “bunch of words and ain’t saying shit.” For 10 points, name this pejorative term often used to describe the music of XXXtentacion and Lil Pump.**

ANSWER: **Mumble** Rap [Accept **Soundcloud** Rap]

- 9) **These two teams had their first postseason match in the 1974 Western Conference Semifinals, in a series featuring Chet Walker and Curtis Rowe. Because the developer of NBA Jam was a fan of one of these two teams, he programmed the other to always miss late shots against the other team, in a game featuring Terry Mills, Joe Dumars, B.J. Amrstrong, and (\*) Scottie Pippen. One of these two teams invented the “Jordan Rules” against the other, on the way to back-to-back titles in 1989 and 1990. For 10 points, name these two teams that played four straight high-profile playoff series, involving Michael Jordan and Isaiah Thomas.**

ANSWER: **Pistons and Bulls** <Brad>

- 10) **In 1972, Mary Rodgers published a novel that popularized this plot. After it happened to Annabel Andrews, the *Help I’m Trapped* series revolved around this plot happening in every book. In the Tom Brady movie *The Hot Chick*, this happens to Jessica and Clive after she steals a pair of earrings. This happens to (\*) Jake and Magic Man in the *Adventure Time* episode “Sons of Mars.” In an episode of *Community*, Troy and Abed are unable to undo this action after losing a DVD, on the third anniversary of the time they watched the movie. For 10 points, name this plot most commonly seen in “Freaky Friday.”**

ANSWER: **Trading Bodies with Someone** [accept descriptive things like **Freaky Friday-ing** until its said] <Brad>

- 11) ***The Great Race* had a fight with this stuff that took \$200,000 and 5 days to film and was designed as a deliberate homage to Mack Sennett and Charlie Chaplin’s *Behind the Screen*. Hedley Lamarr gets attacked with one of these things in the (\*) men’s room during a fight in *Blazing Saddles*. The original ending for *Dr. Strangelove* was supposed to be as a foodfight with this foodstuff in the War Room, but it was changed after the Kennedy Assassination. For 10 points, name this foodstuff often thrown in comedies, that might come in pumpkin and custard cream types.**

ANSWER: **Pie** <Brad>

- 12) **Tom MacKenzie won three Magarey Medals while playing this position in Australian Rules football, and Paul Couch played this position for Geelong. A player of this position usually handles face-offs in**

**hockey and (\*)** Jonathan Toews plays this position for the Blackhawks. In high school football, a player with this position cannot be touched for 1 second after the snap on some plays, and notable players of that position include Jeff Saturday. In basketball, this position was revolutionized by George Mikan and is often referred to as “big men” or “5s.” For 10 points, name this position whose name implies that they are near the middle.

ANSWER: Center [or “Centre” I guess] <Brad>

- 13) **In *Return to Sender*, Jessica Day allows a couple with this name to come together by breaking up with a pediatrician she had been seeing. In the first paintball episode of *Community*, Shirley says Britta and Jeff aren’t [this pair], only for Annie to ask who [this pair] are. One of these people and Boston University Professor Sumner Sloane are the first customers seen of the other person’s (\*) establishment. One of these people left Frasier Crane at the altar, only to fall in love with the other person for a second time. For 10 points, name this central romantic pair that includes Ted Danson’s character in the first five seasons of *Cheers*.**

ANSWER: Sam and Diane

- 14) **A man in this film brags about taking “The [LA] Kings to the cup” in NHL Hockey on the Genesis, with another character retorting it was “against the CPU and with offsides off.” An answering machine in this film tells a man distraught over his girlfriend breaking up with him that “there are plenty of fish in the sea.” In this film, Mike (\*) Peters falls for the Heather Graham played Lorraine after they meet in a bar, and this film popularized the phrase “You’re So Money.” For 10 points, name this film about the neo lounge scene starring Vince Vaughn and Jon Favreau.**

ANSWER: Swingers

- 15) **The first two levels in this game, Warehouse and School, were both repurposed for later games. This is the first game in a series that had two “worst game of the year” winners. You receive up to 5 video tapes for each level in this game’s career mode, and getting enough of them will unlock the (\*) Roswell level. The multiplayer mode allows you to play Horse or Graffiti with characters like Bob Burnquist, Bukey Lasek, and Elissa Steamer. For 10 points, name this first major skateboarding video game named for the first man to do the 900.**

ANSWER: Tony Hawk’s Pro Skater [don’t accept THPS 2, THPS Ride, or any other sequels] <Brad>

- 16) **Fernand Petiot, a bartender from The New York Bar, who claimed to invent this drink, tried to change its name to a “Red Snapper.” This drink is often served as a meal with large meat garnishes. It’s thankfully not charcoal, but in a *Huffington Post* article by Zane Lamprey, this mixed drink was called the (\*) best cure for a hangover. It’s not a Caesar, but this drink is most traditionally garnished with a celery stick. For 10 points, name this drink, made with odd ingredients like horseradish, hot sauce, and tomato juice, perhaps named for Mary I of England.**

ANSWER: Bloody Mary <Brad>

- 17) **In 1982, Linda Thaler and this author co-created the “I’m a Toys R Us Kid” jingle. This author teamed up with Bill Clinton to create the upcoming TV movie *The President is Missing*. A series by this author includes the books *2nd Chance*, *3rd Degree*, and *4th of July*, that being the (\*) *Women’s Murder Club*. This author’s best known character fights a series of Russian men nicknamed “The Wolf” while serving as a detective for the Washington D.C. police department. That character is Alex Cross. For 10 points, name this author with 114 *New York Times* best sellers.**

ANSWER: James Patterson <Brad>

18) **This actor played Little Caesar’s father, Big Caesar, in a cancelled advertising appearance. In one streamable television show, this actor played the detective Fritz who strangles the titular man’s wife. In the 1990s, this actor played Zoe and Zelda’s dad in a namesake show. This actor’s final role came in the TV adaptation of (\*) *Birthday Dad*. One of this actor’s best known roles came hosting a game show created by J.D. Salinger, which had contestants like Lance Bass and Ethan Hawke. For 10 points, name this Labrador Retriever from the Labrador Peninsula, who hosts *Hollywood Stars and Celebrities* on *Bojack Horseman*.**

ANSWER: Mr. Peanutbutter <Brad>

19) **This pitcher is the all-time “strikeouts over walks” leader, and in 2021 was passed by Robbie Ray as the leader for “strikeouts per 9 innings.” Despite never winning a Cy Young, this pitcher finished top 6 in AL voting every year from 2012 to 2018, until finishing 2019 on the 60 day IL. In 2016, this player was sent home when he shredded all of his teammates’ (\*) throwback jerseys, when he was mad about the collars, while with the White Sox. This Lakeland, Florida, native was named the collegiate player of the year while at FGCU, 8 years before throwing a World Series-clinching pitch to Manny Mochado. For 10 points, name this oft-injured Red Sox pitcher nicknamed “The Condor.”**

ANSWER: Chris Sale <Brad>

20) **In a Third Eye Blind song, the God of this domain supposedly “comes crashing through the headlights of a car.” The four-note brass fanfare from the *James Bond* theme is present in a Nancy Sinatra and Lee Hazelwood song named for this commodity. “Poison (\*) and [this substance]” names a Civil Wars’ song and their first EP. Cod reggae outfit UB40 sang a song about the “red, red” variety of this commodity. For 10 points, name this drink; Camila Cabelo and Pharell named a song for the Sangria form of this libation.**

ANSWER: Wine [Accept “Summer Wine”]

- 1) Snape killed Dumbledore, Rosebud was his stupid sled, Vader is Luke's father, and the Man in Black killed his daughter Emily thinking she was a host. For 10 points each;  
 [10] That last event happened in season 2 of this HBO show, based on a Michael Crichton movie.  
 ANSWER: WestWorld  
 [10] This actor plays Caleb in the third season of WestWorld.  
 ANSWER: Aaron Paul  
 [10] This character, played by Evan Rachel Wood, loosely serves as the main character of the show. In the first season, she struggles to gain sentience and ultimately kills Ford.  
 ANSWER: Dolores <Brad>
- 2) The mid to late 2010s have experienced a revival in the collectathon genre of video games. For 10 points each:  
 [10] One product of the platformer revival are compilations, including this Playstation mascot's "N. Sane" trilogy. It includes games like *Cortex Strikes Back* and *Warped*, which star this character.  
 ANSWER: Crash Bandicoot  
 [10] This game's main character, Noodle, is accompanied by a hummingbird named Doodle. Much of this game occurs in the Harmony Foothills and you get the Quetzalcoatl trophy for beating the game without taking damage.  
 ANSWER: Snake Pass  
 [10] The composer for *Snake Pass*, David Wise, also composed the music for this franchise with compositions like "Aquatic Ambience" and "Mine Cart Madness."  
 ANSWER: Donkey Kong Country
- 3) T.S. Elliot one time said "March is the cruelest month." Or he would have if he weren't a fucking nerd. Name why for 10 points each;  
 [10] This team was undefeated heading into the 2021 March Madness, coasted to the finals, and then lost horribly to Baylor. Coach Mark Few was denied the long-elusive title in his 22nd season.  
 ANSWER: Gonzaga (prompt on "Bulldogs")  
 [10] This team made the finals in 2010 and 2011, both times as 8-seeds, but lost the finals to Duke, and then UCONN. Brad Stevens then left this team to coach in the NBA.  
 ANSWER: Butler (prompt on "Bulldogs")  
 [10] All-time entertaining Cinderella team, "Dunk City," of this school, lost to some orange and blue jackasses from Gainesville, after poaching #2 Georgetown and #7 SDSU, in 2013.  
 ANSWER: FGCU (or Florida Gulf Coast University. "Prompt on Eagles") <Brad>
- 4) This man had a verse cut out of the song "Famous" on *The Life of Pablo*, but does it appear on the earlier track "Ultralight Beam." For 10 points each:  
 [10] Name this artist who raps the verses of "Sunday Candy" for Donnie Trumpet and the Social Experiment. This rapper featured his brother, Taylor Bennett, on the song "Roo" from his 2019 album, *The Big Day*.  
 ANSWER: Chance the Rapper [Accept Chancellor Bennett]  
 [10] *The Big Day* also has a feature by this female rapper that occasionally goes by the alias of Tina Snow who performed W.A.P. with Cardi B in 2020.  
 ANSWER: Megan Thee Stallion [Accept Megan Pete]  
 [10] Due to borrowing from the song "Impossible" from *Cinderella*, these people get a writing credit on *The Big Day*'s closer, "Zanies and Fools."  
 ANSWER: Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein

- 5) Gary Larson teased a return to comics in 2019, prompting dozens of fans to turn to Google, asking why that name sounded familiar. For 10 points each;  
[10] It turns out that Gary Larson was the cartoonist behind this 1980s and 1990s cartoon that held a weird obsession with death and cows.  
ANSWER: The **Far Side**  
[10] Larson came under heavy fire for calling this woman a tramp in a cartoon. Thankfully, this author of *In the Shadow of Man*, *Reason For Hope*, and *Rickie and Henri* enjoyed the strip.  
ANSWER: Jane **Goodall**  
[10] In 1983, the *Dayton Daily News* accidentally and confusingly switched the captions for *The Far Side* and this strip twice. This Hank Ketcham comic bizarrely debuted the same day as a British strip of the same name.  
ANSWER: **Dennis the Menace** <Brad>
- 6) While the title character works at a school for the blind, he has odd conversations with a poster of Hitler saying “you killed the Hippies; you killed all the mothers' titties!” For 10 points each:  
[10] Name this film where Chloë Sevigny miscarries while ice skating. The title character strangles a small child early on in the film while with turtles.  
ANSWER: **Julien Donkey-Boy**  
[10] *Julien Donkey-Boy* is by this director of *Spring Breakers* and writer of the film *Kids*.  
ANSWER: Harmony **Korine**  
[10] Another film by Korine, *Mister Lonely*, deals with a Michael Jackson impersonator falling in love with an impersonator of this actress, known for her role in *Some Like it Hot*.  
ANSWER: Marilyn **Monroe** [Accept Norma Jeane **Mortensen** or Norma Jean **Baker**]
- 7) This artist’s “Happy House” is used in the Gus Van Sant film *Finding Forrester*. For 10 points each:  
[10] Name this artist who won the Pulitzer for his album *Sound Grammar*. He brought on guitarist Jerry Garcia to play on a few tracks on his *Virgin Beauty*.  
ANSWER: Ornette **Coleman**  
[10] Coleman is perhaps best known for his album *The Shape of [this genre] to Come*. He helped pioneer the “Free” form of this genre that also has “Acid” and “Smooth” variants.  
ANSWER: **Jazz**  
[10] He is featured on “AOS,” a song on this artist’s partly self-titled album. This avant-garde artist participated in Bed-Ins for Peace with her spouse.  
ANSWER: Yoko **Ono**
- 8) Name some people who have appeared in Marvel and DC movies for 10 points each;  
[10] *V for Vendetta* is actually a DC film, making this actress someone in both universes. She plays Jane, Thor’s girlfriend, in the Marvel universe. She’s also been in *Leon: The Professional* and *Black Swan*.  
ANSWER: Natalie **Portman**  
[10] This man played The Silver Surfer in *The Rise of the Silver Surfer* and also played Lois’s boss Perry White in *Man of Steel*. One of his earliest roles was in *Apocalypse Now*.  
ANSWER: Laurence **Fishburne**  
[10] This man played Two-Face in *Batman Forever* and Colonel Phillips in *Captain America*. He was Al Gore’s roommate in college.  
ANSWER: Tommy Lee **Jones** <Brad>
- 9) While playing at Syracuse, this man’s R.A. was Jim Boeheim, and in 1967 this man led the Orange in receiving with 257 yards. For 10 points each;

[10] Name this exacting former head coach who won three Super Bowls with the Giants, before and after a stint with Jacksonville.

ANSWER: Tom **Coughlin**

[10] One of Coughlin's better known wins with the Jaguars was a 62-7 postseason route, which turned out to be this legendary quarterback's final game. This Dolphin led the league in passing 5 times.

ANSWER: Dan **Marino**

[10] Before coaching Jacksonville, Coughlin went 21-13-1 as the head coach of this then-Big East team, a few decades after coaching RIT. He narrowly missed coaching Matt Hasselbeck.

ANSWER: **Boston College** <Brad>

10) Demonstrate your knowledge of stock clues for 10 points each;

[10] Beef stock, or drippings, is mixed with flour or cornstarch to make this sauce that is often used in Shepherd's Pie.

ANSWER: Brown **Gravy**

[10] This is the name of the crime that's committed when you buy stock off of confidential knowledge you've obtained. Martha Stewart was sentenced for this crime but Phil Mickelson escaped.

ANSWER: **Insider Trading**

[10] Guy Ritchie's film *Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels* is about four guys and two smoking barrels. Name any two of the four friends who get in deep to the mob after a bad card game.

ANSWER: [any two of] **Tom, Soap, Eddy, and Bacon** <Brad>

11) 2020's World Series had the lowest rated game 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 ever, so there's a good chance you're going to 0 this! Name some things about that year's Series for 10 points each;

[10] This team beat the Rays to win their first title since 1988. This California-based team started Clayton Kershaw in game 1 of the Series, where he tied Maddux's mark of 11 postseason starts.

ANSWER: Los Angeles **Dodgers** [Prompt on "Los Angeles"]

[10] This Dodgers shortstop was named World Series MVP after knocking in two homers and the go-ahead Series-winning RBI. His brother played third base for the Mariners.

ANSWER: **Corey Seager** [prompt on "Seager"]

[10] This annoying commentator called the series for Fox once again, his 23rd time in 25 years. This commentator received a phantom "voice injury" after getting hair plugs and usually calls NFL games with Troy Aikman.

ANSWER: Joe **Buck** <Brad>

12) Name some historic horror movies for 10 points each;

[10] A 1931 movie, named for this doctor, invented the hunchbacked character Igor. Boris Karloff starred as the doctor's namesake monster.

ANSWER: **Frankenstein**

[10] "Tubular Bells" served as the iconic theme for this 1973 movie that starred Ellen Burstyn and Linda Blair as Chris and Reagan MacNeil

ANSWER: *The Exorcist*

[10] This 1920 German film is about the titular hypnotist who uses a sleepwalking patient to commit violent murders for him. Ebert called it the first true horror film and one French theater ran it for 7 years straight.

ANSWER: *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari* <Brad>

13) The protagonist of this Ray Davies written song says "[he] isn't the world's most passionate guy." For 10 points each:

[10] Name this rock song by the Kinks about the title transgender woman that begins in a “club in old Soho.”

ANSWER: “**Lola**”

[10] It was once speculated that the “Lola” in the song was actually this actress, a transgender woman who starred alongside Robert De Niro in film *Glamour, Glory and Gold* and later *Women in Revolt*.

ANSWER: **Candy Darling** [Accept either]

[10] Both *Glamour, Glory and Gold* and *Women in Revolt* are films made by this director who also produced the six hour piece, *Sleep*.

ANSWER: Andy **Warhol**

- 14) Ahhh the 1990s. Flannel, Pogs, messy hair, Lunchables, and race riots. Another interesting quirk it had was TV crossovers. Name some things about a few of them for 10 points each;

[10] In a crossover between *Rugrats* and this show, Angelica tries to scare the babies with a ghost story involving Ickis, Oblina, and Krumm, who appear to scare Angelica at the end.

ANSWER: ***Aaahh! Real Monsters!***

[10] The cast of this puppet-based show save Kenan and Kel in a weird episode involving a treasure map and an evil dude-ranch owner. This show’s titular character moved from Atlanta to New York to be near Bobby.

ANSWER: ***Cousin Skeeter***

[10] This character from *Friends* struck out with both of the women from *Caroline in the City* in “The One with the Baby on the Bus.” It’s a shame, too, because he ends up marrying Monica at the end.

ANSWER: **Chandler** Bing <Brad>

- 15) While this woman spent very little time in front of the camera, basically just as Sister Sophia in *The Sound of Music*, she’s one of the most iconic voices in Hollywood. For 10 points each;

[10] Name this ghost-singer for Kerr in *The King and I*, Natalie Wood in *West Side Story*, Monroe in *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes*, and Hepburn in *My Fair Lady*, among many others.

ANSWER: Marni **Nixon**

[10] Nixon made her operatic debut with *Carmina Burana*, directed by this Philadelphia Orchestra leader who may be best known for directing Disney’s *Fantasia*.

ANSWER: Leopold **Stokowski**

[10] Nixon voiced the geese in this movie, but Julie Andrews sang for herself and was Supercalofraij--- I’m already bored, you know it.

ANSWER: ***Mary Poppins*** <Brad>

- 16) JCD II talked about one relative of Motown legend Barry Gordy, let’s talk about two others. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this group whose members are made up of Redfoo and Skyblu. They had smash hits with “Sexy and I Know It” and “Party Rock Anthem.”

ANSWER: **LMFAO**

[10] This LMFAO song that features Lil Jon has lines like “We Love Patron” and “We love Ciroc.” It has some other basic club lyrics.

ANSWER: “**Shots**”

[10] In case you’re wondering, this bonus CAN get trashier. LMFAO provided the theme song for this spinoff of *Keeping up with the Kardashians*.

ANSWER: ***Kourtney and Khloé Take Miami*** [Accept ***Kourtney and Kim Take Miami*** due to the name change during season 3]



- 17) The CEO of this beverage once claimed in an ad that people that didn't drink his beverage were mentally challenged. For 10 points each:  
[10] Name this energy drink that flexes the fact that it has "SUPER CREATINE." This beverage with an onomatopoeic name spiked in popularity in 2018 and 2019 .  
ANSWER: **Bang** Energy Drink  
[10] The early success of Bang was, in part, due to a positive review in this DIY online media outlet first created to spread happenings and other news about Greek Life on American college campuses.  
ANSWER: **Odyssey**  
[10] One of the least appealing flavors of Bang is one based on this carnival staple that is named for its resemblance to a crop often used to produce apparel.  
ANSWER: **Cotton Candy** [or **Candy Floss**]
- 18) Given a movie that won the Oscar for Best Adapted Screenplay, name either the author of the original book, or the Oscar winner who adapted it, for 10 points each;  
[10] *No Country for Old Men*  
ANSWER: Either Cormac **McCarthy** OR The **Coen Brothers** [or Joel **Coen** or Ethan **Coen**]  
[10] *Forrest Gump*  
ANSWER: Eric **Roth** OR Winston **Groom**  
[10] *M\*A\*S\*H\**  
ANSWER: Richard **Lardner** OR Richard **Hooker** <Brad>
- 19) Somehow I think that asking about variants of tag is a good idea apparently? For 10 points each;  
[10] This game is comparable to "Blind Man's Bluff," but it has "fish out of water" rules. In some regions, it's called "Alligator."  
ANSWER: **Marco Polo**  
[10] This national sport of Bangladesh has a "circle" style, or Punjabi Style; and the "Standard" style, which is played at the Asian Games. One "raider" attempts to tag as many of the 7 defenders as possible while chanting the game's title.  
ANSWER: **Kabaddi**  
[10] This game is particularly popular with children, or drunk members of UCF quiz bowl. You sit in a circle, tap people on the head, and name one of the two titular fowl. When the "it" names the other bird, the person tagged has to get up and tag them back. If they fail, they have to "be it" or "do David's dishes," depending on the group.  
ANSWER: **Duck Duck Goose** <Brad>
- 20) Name some of the highest rated TV shows from the 1960-1961 season, for 10 points each;  
[10] This TV show, which ran for 20 years, was the #1 show in 1960, for the 4th year in a row. Mostly starring James Arness as Matt Dillon, this show was personally saved by William Paley, who cancelled *Gilligan's Island* for it.  
ANSWER: **Gunsmoke**  
[10] This show finished 4th that year, largely thanks to Don Knotts as Deputy Barney Fife. Ron Howard got his start as Opie in this way-too-wholesome show about Mayberry, North Carolina.  
ANSWER: *The* **Andy Griffith Show**  
[10] At 7th place, this show was the highest non-Western non-Mayberry show in 1960. This Allen Funt production returned as its own show that year after being a bit on *The Garry Moore Show*.  
ANSWER: **Candid Camera** <Brad>

21) If you like to talk to tomatoes, if a squash can make you smile, or if you like to waltz with potatoes, it sounds like a pretty good acid trip to me. Name some things about a kids series for 10 points each;  
[10] This explicitly Christian kid's series tells Bible stories with unusual, sentient cucumbers and tomatoes. One of the earliest computer animated franchises, this series has characters like Pa Grape and Archibald the Asparagus.

ANSWER: *VeggieTales*

[10] This talking tomato narrated most of the early stories, like Dave and the Giant Pickle, and either he or Larry the Cucumber ended every episode by saying "God made you special and He loves you very much."

ANSWER: Bob the Tomato

[10] This other (probably LSD inspired) BigIdeas series follows Zidgel, Midge, Fidge, and Kevin, birds who explore "Trouble on Planet Wait-Your-Turn" and "The Cheating Scales of Bullamanka."

ANSWER *3-2-1 Penguins!* <Brad>

22) In 1962, Wilt Chamberlain led the NBA in most statistics. Name some people who finished in second, for 10 points each;

[10] This player was second in minutes played and offensive win shares. 1962 was his only season averaging a triple-double.

ANSWER: Oscar Robertson

[10] This rookie for the Chicago Packers was second, behind Wilt, in points. This Hall of Famer beat Wilt for shooting percentage, too, before being shipped off to the Knicks.

ANSWER: Walt Bellamy

[10] This Celtic finished behind Wilt for rebounds. He probably didn't lose much sleep. He won his fifth ring, of 11, that year.

ANSWER: Bill Russell <Brad>
